

Park Superintendent Don Campbell Retires

After 29 years as the superintendent of Harpers Ferry NHP, Superintendent Donald W. Campbell has decided to retire.


He's forged partnerships to help the park expand by hundreds of acres, overseen major events at the park, worked to preserve Murphy Farm from development and insured the restoration of the Harpers Ferry Train Station.

Campbell, 65, said he could have retired II years ago but wanted to stay to see these projects to their completion.

Born in Napa, California, Campbell earned a MLA at the University of California, Berkeley. After graduation his first assignment was in Yellowstone National Park. He continued as a planner for parks in the West while stationed in San Francisco. In 1972, he tranferred to Seattle, Washington and worked extensively to establish new park lands in Alaska. He came to work in the National Park Service's Washington, D.C. office in 1978.

A year later, Campbell realized his goal of becoming superintendent of a national park when he was chosen to run Harpers Ferry National Historical Park.

Local officials talk about respect, good



relationships and results from Campbell's office. Harpers Ferry Mayor Jim Addy said Campbell has been good to work with on issues like parking and Addy praised the park's work on projects like the Niagara Movement anniversary.

"He's really been a fixture nationally and locally. He's done so much to bring attention to our community. It's just a terrific career," Jefferson County Commissioner Rusty Morgan said. "It's hard to believe he's retiring, really. I think of him as a young man," Morgan said.

Paul Rosa, executive director of the Harpers Ferry Conservancy, said the public-private partnerships Campbell built to acquire land for the park were impressive. "You could see the results in the amount of land that was saved," Rosa said.

Campbell said other highlights of his career at Harpers Ferry were establishing a shuttle bus system for visitors, dealing with three major floods and welcoming national dignitaries that included Sandra Day O'Connor, Nancy Reagan, Al Gore, and President Bill Clinton.

Campbell was the recipient of the prestigious 2007 Stephen T. Mather Award from the National Parks Conservation Association.

Campbell thanked U.S. Sen. Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., local elected officials, public and private partners and "my wonderful staff" that made "this beautiful park as we see it today."

Campbell and his wife, Sandy, plan to stay in the Shepherdstown, W.Va., area and enjoy time with their children and grandchildren. They also plan to visit national parks they love.
