The **U.S. Public Health Service Commissioned Corps**, one of seven uniformed services of the United States, for more than 200 years has been our Nation's frontline against the spread of disease from sailors returning from foreign ports, to immigrants entering the country, to communities affected by natural and manmade disasters. Today's Commissioned Corps is an elite team of more than 6,000 active-duty commissioned officers that are well-trained, highly qualified public health professionals dedicated to delivering the Nation's public health promotion and disease prevention programs and advancing public health science.

Therapist officers in the Commissioned Corps:

- Provide essential public health and health care services to underserved and disadvantaged populations.
- Respond to public health emergencies.
- Conduct research.
- Implement evidenced-based research into clinical practice.
- Develop national health policies.

Therapist officers in the Commissioned Corps work throughout the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and in other Federal agencies and programs. The majority of therapist officers are assigned to the following:
