
EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

As the table illustrates, performance for Program Year 2007 of Workforce Investment Act (WIA) has resulted in Michigan meeting or exceeding the negotiated performance levels in the Adult, Dislocated Worker, and Youth Programs as well as the Customer Satisfaction measures.

Performance Level Achieved



Note: Performance levels are calculated by dividing actual statewide Program Year 2007 performance by the negotiated planned performance level for the state for each WIA program and overall customer satisfaction.

PERFORMANCE MEASURES

COST EFFECTIVE PROGRAMS:

The Adult program maintained an expenditure rate of 98 percent. Expenditures totaled \$43.3 million of the \$44.3 million available during Program Year 2007. Expenditures were divided between core services (34%), intensive services (25%), and training services (41%). Adult participants who received training services were more likely to obtain employment (7% increase), retain employment (9% increase) with greater earnings (10% increase). The average cost per participant served was \$2,403. Return on investment was measured using the adult average earnings in six months performance indicator and the total program cost of the Adult program. The earnings of adults will exceed total Adult program expenditures within seven months.

The Dislocated Worker program maintained an expenditure rate of 96 percent. Expenditures totaled \$42.7 million of the \$44.4 million available during Program Year 2007. Expenditures were divided between core services (32%), intensive services (25%), and training services (43%). Dislocated worker participants who received training services were more likely to obtain (2% increase), retain employment (4% increase) and increase (9%) average earnings. The average cost per participant served was \$2,919. Since Dislocated Worker program participants are unemployed or facing layoff, total post program earnings was used to measure return on investment. The earnings of dislocated workers will exceed total Dislocated Worker program expenditures within six months.

The Youth program maintained an expenditure rate of 98 percent. Expenditures totaled \$35.7 million of the \$36.6 million available during Program Year 2007. The average cost per participant served was \$2,424. Front-end costs are limited to 10 percent from administration. The bulk of the funding supports direct service costs for the ten youth program elements. Summer youth employment costs represent 14 percent all youth program expenditures. Return on investment is difficult to measure for the Youth program because younger youth (aged 14 to 18) are primarily exited to secondary school rather than employment. Using the older youth earnings change in six months and the average cost per participant exited for all youth, older youth increased earnings will exceed older youth program expenditures within one year.

EVALUATION OF PROGRAMS:

Michigan has implemented the Value Added Performance Improvement System (VAPIS) model in order to measure workforce development program success. VAPIS was developed in Michigan under a grant to the state from the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration, Performance Results Office. The Michigan Department of Labor and Economic Growth partnered with the Corporation for a Skilled Workforce, Public Policy Associates, and the W.E. Upjohn Institute for Employment Research, for research, development, and implementation of the VAPIS model.

VAPIS allows adjustments to the performance of state and local workforce programs to account for the characteristics of the participants served and the local economic conditions under which the program operates. It also measures the amount of value added by the local workforce area programs in terms of the effectiveness of services delivered, identifies areas for program improvement, and provides information to program managers on a real-time basis to predict area performance.

VAPIS is based on a model developed by the W.E Upjohn Institute for Employment Research. It provides an evidence-based approach to setting and negotiating performance measures for publicly funded workforce programs. By using a statistical approach to separate the impact of factors that are outside the control of the local workforce area (LWA) (client characteristics and local economic conditions) from the impact of factors within the control of the LWA (type and quality of services), VAPIS is able to measure the value added by the LWA.

WORKFORCE INVESTMENT ACT SUCCESS STORIES

Enabling workers to acquire the skills necessary to succeed in the fast-changing global economy of the 21st Century is central to Michigan's strategy for economic transformation. In her 2007 State of the State Address, Governor Jennifer Granholm announced the No Worker Left Behind (NWLB) free tuition program to help Michigan workers create a prosperous future. Since it was launched in August 2007, over 31,000 people have entered training through NWLB. The Governor continued to stress the importance of education, training, and lifelong learning for our adult workforce in her 2008 State of the State Address. The vision for NWLB is to:

- Accelerate worker transitions through learning;
- Support the state's employers and economic development needs, and
- Align the use of existing training resources.

NWLB is Michigan's unified strategy for supporting workers in obtaining the training they need to make successful transitions from one career/job to another. NWLB includes all public monies, including Workforce Investment Act, monies used for training.

NWLB features:

- Up to two years worth of free tuition at any Michigan community college, university or other approved training program;
- A skills assessment administered the Michigan Works! Agencies (MWAs);
- Must pursue a degree or occupational certificate in a high-demand occupation or emerging industry, or in an entrepreneurship program;
- Free tuition program is a one-time offer; and
- Three years to sign up for the program beginning August 1, 2007.

Qualifying workers must pursue an associate's degree or attend a technical training program in a high-demand occupation, emerging industry, or entrepreneurship program. High-demand occupations vary from region to region, however some common examples include health care, accounting and bookkeeping services, information technology, auto service technicians and mechanics.

Demmer Corporation, Lansing

In Lansing, director of Michigan Department of Labor & Economic Growth (DLEG), Bureau of Workforce Transformation (BWT), Liza Estlund Olson, recognized Demmer Corporation, Lansing Community College (LCC), and Capital Area Michigan Works! for their model NWLB partnership -- a collaborative effort between business and college to design an innovative training program that resulted in Demmer hiring more than 530 NWLB-trained workers for jobs in Demmer Corp's Lansing facilities.

Demmer Human Resource Director, Julie Mann: "We needed to increase our workforce by almost 80 percent in a calendar year. We never would have been able to meet our customer demand without a program to train workers in a very short period of time. NWLB gave us the opportunity to work with LCC in developing and implementing a tailored training program."

Joshua Smalley

Joshua Smalley is one of the NWLB-trained workers now employed at Demmer Corporation. Prior to his NWLB training, Joshua had worked as a truck driver. He was also an experienced welder, having spent 15 years welding in his family's auto repair shop. He tried to land a job at Demmer, but failed the required skills assessment tests. "I was used to welding on thinner metal," said Joshua. "I found out it's a lot harder to weld the thicker materials that Demmer uses."

A few weeks later, Capital Area Michigan Works! contacted Joshua to tell him about NWLB and the opportunity to train for one of the Demmer positions. He jumped at the chance. Lansing Community College instructors came to the Demmer plant, and in three weeks, Joshua had completed training in the specific welding techniques required to work on the Demmer products.

"With the help of No Worker Left Behind, I'm able to provide for my family, which was my biggest goal," said Joshua. "I love working, and this is a good place to work."

Schoolcraft Biomedical Technology Center, Livonia

At Schoolcraft College's new, state-of-the-art Biomedical Technology Center in Livonia, DLEG Director Keith Cooley and DLEG Deputy Director Andy Levin recognized Schoolcraft for its cutting-edge health care curriculum, and the successful collaboration between the college, Southeast Michigan Community Alliance, and employers like CVS Pharmacy to train workers for high-wage careers in health care and the emerging biomedical industry.

Harvey Diem

In 2000, Harvey Diem was working as an uncertified pharmacy technician at a hospital in Colorado when he was laid off. He moved to Michigan and found other employment, but wanted to return to work in a health care position. Diem contacted his local Michigan Works! Agency, and with NWLB training funds, he enrolled in the Schoolcraft College pharmacy technician program.

"The MWA staff and I worked together as a team," said Diem. "They helped me assert myself and pushed me to do well, and I did."

Diem graduated in the top two of his class with a certificate as a pharmacy technician. He now works for CVS Pharmacy, and he is pursuing national certification as a pharmacy technician. In the future, Diem plans to pursue a degree in pharmacological toxicology and work for a pharmaceutical company.

"Without the support of programs like NWLB, many of our current employees would not be with us today," said Darla Smith, Regional Learning Center Manager for CVS Pharmacy. "It's imperative that Michigan continue to provide training for people in high-demand fields in health care and biomedical technology, where the demand for talent is greater than the supply of trained workers."

Upper Peninsula State Fair, Escanaba

At the Upper Peninsula State Fair in Escanaba, Governor Granholm recognized Northern Star Industries, Bay College, and the Job Force Board for their model NWLB partnership -- a collaborative effort between business, college, and the local workforce agency that resulted in Northern Star and other Upper Peninsula businesses hiring more than 100 workers.

Northern Star Industries, Inc., located in Iron Mountain, manufactures the BOSS Snowplow, state-of-the-art control panels and substation control centers for electrical utilities, and specialty controls for the U.S. Navy. In 2007, Northern Star was looking to expand and hire additional employees, but discovered there was a shortage of welders and skilled trade workers in the region. Northern Star turned to the Job Force Board for help. This Michigan Works! Agency pulled together employers, their own workforce experts, and faculty from Bay College and Dickinson Iron Intermediate School District to design and implement a customized program to train workers in welding and other high-demand skills. To date, more than 100 workers have gone through the NWLB-funded training and found jobs in local industries.

Dave Brule, Jr., Executive Vice President and Chief Financial Officer of Northern Star Industries stated "With NWLB, we were able to train workers for the exact skills we needed to help us expand, and put people to work in good jobs right here in their own communities. We're looking to add additional workers in the coming year, and we know we have the partners and training options to meet our needs for the skilled workers our industry requires."

Governor Granholm: "This innovative collaboration between Northern Star Industries and Bay College, working with Michigan Works! and NWLB to train workers for jobs available today is exactly the kind of partnership we want to replicate all over Michigan. With the boost of NWLB training dollars, we can move Michigan workers in to high-skill, high-wage jobs and grow Michigan's economy."

Tom Swartout

Tom Swartout was working at a local retail store in Iron Mountain and looking for a new career when he heard about the NWLB Initiative. He had taken a semester of welding at Bay College and decided to consult the Michigan Works! The Job Force Board to explore options for additional education. With the help of Michigan Works! Swartout was accepted into the welding certification course at Bay College. Upon graduation, he got a job as a fabricator welder at BOSS Products division of Northern Star Industries.

Macomb Community College, Mt. Clemens

In the first 11 months of the NWLB, the Macomb/St. Clair Michigan Works! Agency (MWA) enrolled 2,271 people in training and educational programs to prepare them for jobs in Michigan's emerging economy.

Governor Granholm: "Macomb County is a leader in our effort to train 100,000 Michigan workers for good jobs, today and tomorrow. With the hard work of our Michigan Works! Agencies and their innovative partners like Macomb Community College (MCC) and local employers, NWLB will put thousands of workers into new high-wage jobs in the years ahead."

Macomb County employer Burtek Incorporated works regularly with the Macomb/St. Clair MWA to test and hire employees.

"Burtek is primarily a military fabricator, making vehicles stronger for our troops in Afghanistan and Iraq, and for our own homeland security forces. We have a special place in our hearts for veterans, and Michigan Works! and NWLB has helped us find and train many veterans for good jobs in our facilities."

April Pritchett

Two years ago, April Pritchett lost her job in the mortgage industry. She had earned an associate of arts degree years before, but knew she needed additional training to find another job. April contacted the Macomb / St. Clair MWA, enrolled in business classes at MCC, and found a new, high-wage job with a mortgage company.

"I'm no spring chicken, so when I lost my job, not only did I need job training, I needed help with my resume, and preparing to look for work," said Pritchett. "With the help of the Macomb/St. Clair MWA and No Worker Left Behind, I enrolled in MCC and got a great job to support my family. I also learned about Macomb's early entry program for high school students. Last year my 12th grade son attended MCC with me."

'Green' jobs expand Michigan worker retraining

Joseph Houle

When Joseph Houle lost his job at a Petoskey factory in late 2006, he decided to retrain to be a police officer. This month, he started working as a marine deputy with the Cheboygan County Sheriff's Department.

The state's NWLB program, started a year ago by Gov. Jennifer Granholm to give laid-off workers up to two years of tuition toward new careers, helped the 37-year-old complete his police academy training.

"It helped with tuition and fees, money for books," said Houle, who likely would have been unable to afford the retraining without the state program. "It helped in a lot of ways."

The governor is carving out about \$6 million in the budget year that starts Oct. 1, 2008 for her Green Jobs Initiative that will promote job training in alternative energy industries including wind, solar and biofuels.

Granholm's office said that Biotech Agronomics, a Beulah company that converts wastewater sludge into usable materials for agriculture, already has hired five No Worker Left Behind graduates for such jobs.

The goal of the NWLB program is to take workers who have lost manufacturing jobs or other positions no longer in demand and retrain them for employment in one of several high-demand fields. Workers can use the free tuition at any Michigan community college or other approved training course.
