## Maternal Depression

## CES-D Depression Scale

- A 12-item scale measuring levels of depression
- Score range 0-36

Mean = 7.6
SD = 6.7
alpha = . 86

## Over One Fourth Were Classified as Moderately or Severely Depressed

Not Depressed<br>41\%<br>Mildly Depressed<br>28\%

Moderately Depressed
16\%
Severely Depressed
13\%

## Levels of Depression Varied by Ethnicity



## Mothers Were Less Depressed When Fathers Lived in the Home

\% Classified as Moderately or or Severely Depressed

Without Father in Home With Father in Home<br>33\%<br>23\%

## Maternal Depression Had Significant Effects on Parents

## Parents who were more depressed ...

$\square$ Were more likely to have lost employment from fall to spring,
$\square$ Had a lower household income,
$\square$ Had a need for and used more social services,
$\square$ Had a more external locus of control,
$\square$ Had less social support,
$\square$ Were more likely to live with smokers or problem drinkers,
$\square$ Engaged in fewer safety practices with their children.

## Maternal Depression Had Significant Effects On Children's Outcomes

When parents were more depressed, they ...

- Participated in fewer activities with their children,
$\square$ Reported more problem behavior for their children,
$\square$ Reported less positive social behavior for their children,
$\square$ Reported lower emergent literacy skills for their children,
$\square$ Were almost twice as likely to spank their children.


## Maternal Depression Had an Effect On Children's Cognitive Outcomes

## Children of parents who were severely depressed did significantly worse on ...

One-to-One
Counting (early math, labeling)

Creativity (Self-expression)

Book Knowledge (book familiarity)

Design Copying (perceptual-motor skills)

Color Naming
(expressive vocabulary)

Social Awareness (oral communication about self)

WJ Letter-Word ID (letter recognition, word decoding)

## Exposure to Violence

5-Item Measure of Neighborhood/Personal Violence

- Saw non-violent crime in neighborhood
$\square$ Saw violent crime in neighborhood
- Know victim of violent crime in neighborhood
$\square$ Victim of violent crime in neighborhood
$\square$ Victim of violent crime in home

Score range 0-15
Mean = 6.1
$S D=1.6$

Response Categories
Never, Once, More than once

## Exposure to Violence Has Direct and Indirect Effects on Child Outcomes

## Maternal Depression Mediated the Relationship Between Neighborhood Violence and Child Behavior

## Correlation between

a. Neighborhood Violence and Child Behavior $\quad r=.09, p<.0001$
b. Neighborhood Violence and Maternal Depression $r=.26, p<.0001$
c. Maternal Depression and Child Behavior $\quad r=.28, p<.0001$


## Involvement with the Criminal Justice System

## Parents reported . . .

...whether they, another household member (or a non-household biological parent) had been arrested or charged with a crime by the police.

If yes, parents indicated:
$\square$ Relationship of this person to the child, and
$\square$ Whether or not this person spent time in jail.

## More than One Fifth of Head Start Families Had Involvement with the Criminal Justice System

$23 \%$ of families had someone arrested or charged with crime. $18 \%$ reported someone had spent time in jail.
$94 \%$ of those who were arrested were mothers or fathers.
$17 \%$ of all fathers, and
$5 \%$ of all mothers were arrested or charged with a crime.

## Involvement with the Criminal Justice System Varied by Ethnicity

## Involvement with the Criminal Justice System Impacted Families

Families with members who had been arrested or charged with a crime were . . .

Almost twice as likely to have parents who were depressed.
2.5 times more likely to be families headed by single mothers.

Over 4-times more likely to have parents who have been victims of violent crime in their homes.

## Children from Families Who Had Someone Arrested

## Were at Risk for Exposure to Violence

$\square$ Almost 5-times more likely to have been a witness to violent crime or domestic violence, and
$\square$ 4-times more likely to have been a victim of violent crime or domestic violence.

## Were Reported by Teachers to

$\square$ Have more problem behavior, and
$\square$ Be more aggressive and hyperactive.

## Had Lower Scores on

$\square$ McCarthy Draw-A-Design Task, and
$\square$ Woodcock-Johnson Letter-Word Identification Task.

## Cumulative Family Risk

## 6-item Risk Index

Child not living with two parents
$\square$ Head of household a high school dropout
$\square$ Family income below the poverty line

- Child living with parent(s) who did not have steady, full-time employment
$\square$ Family receiving welfare benefits
$\square$ Child did not have health insurance

Score range 0-6
Mean = 2.21
$S D=1.39$

## Cumulative Risk

$21 \%$ of the families had 4 or more risk factors

Parents from families with four or more risk factors
$\square$ Were more depressed
$\square$ Reported less social support
Had a more external locus of control

## Children from Families with 4+ Risk Factors Were Negatively Affected

$\square$ Reported by teachers to have more problem behavior
$\square$ Had significantly lower scores on:

One-to-One Counting (early math and labeling)<br>Design<br>Copying (perceptual-motor skills)<br>Book<br>Knowledge<br>(familiarity with books)<br>Print<br>Concepts (print conventions)<br>WJ Applied Problems (early math, problem solving)<br>Color<br>Naming<br>(expressive vocabulary)<br>PPVT<br>(receptive vocabulary, general knowledge)<br>WJ Letter-Word ID (letter recognition, word decoding)
