


Electronic Funds Transfer

Electronic child support payments give employers many useful advantages that often include less paperwork, reduced bank fees, and convenience.

Effective April 1, 2007, employers with the Oregon Child Support (OCS) 254143 to be paid to the Oregon Child Support Division (OCS) are required to submit all child support payments by Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) per OAR 137-055-5023.

The Division of Child Support notices there may be a seasonal delay in starting up your EFT. Please continue to remain on child support payments by check until the OCS 254143 of your preferred EFT method has been considered. Please advise us if your situation will not be compliant by the compliance date shown on the two notices of EFT.

ACH Debit "CSPay Available Now"

Employers can register for the Oregon Child Support Payment (OCSPay) starting Mar. 2007.

This payment system is an automated, secure system that allows employers to pay child support payments directly to the Oregon Child Support Division (OCS) on a date of their choosing. OCSPay will ensure employers can meet their obligations and make child support payments.

OCSPay is a safe, efficient method of EFT. It does not require payments to check and you can register for an account to receive child support payments starting Mar. 1, 2007.

ACH Credit "Available Now"

This payment system is an Automated Clearinghouse (ACH) Credit. It allows employers to make child support payments directly to the Oregon Child Support Division (OCS) on a date of their choosing.

Automated Clearinghouse (ACH) Credit

GETTING STARTED

Child Support is a critical financial obligation for all parents. The Oregon Child Support Division (OCS) is committed to helping parents meet their obligations. The OCS provides a secure, efficient method of payment through the Automated Clearinghouse (ACH) Credit system. This system allows employers to make child support payments directly to the OCS on a date of their choosing.

STEP 1: REGISTER WITH OCS AND WITH YOUR BUSINESS

The Oregon Child Support Division (OCS) is responsible for processing and distributing child support payments. To register for the OCS, employers must provide certain information, including their business name, address, and contact information. Once registered, employers can begin making payments through the OCS.

STEP 2: REQUEST FOR CHILD SUPPORT INFORMATION

Employers must request information from the OCS regarding their child support obligations. This information includes the amount of the payment, the date of payment, and the name of the child support recipient. Once this information is received, employers can begin making payments through the OCS.

STEP 3: ACH DEBIT AUTHORIZATION

Employers must authorize the OCS to debit their business account for child support payments. This authorization is done through the OCS website or by submitting a signed authorization form to the OCS.

STEP 4: THE TIME FOR CHILD SUPPORT PAYMENT

The new hire reporting law requires all employers to report new hires to the Oregon Department of Employment Services (DES) within 30 days of the hire date.

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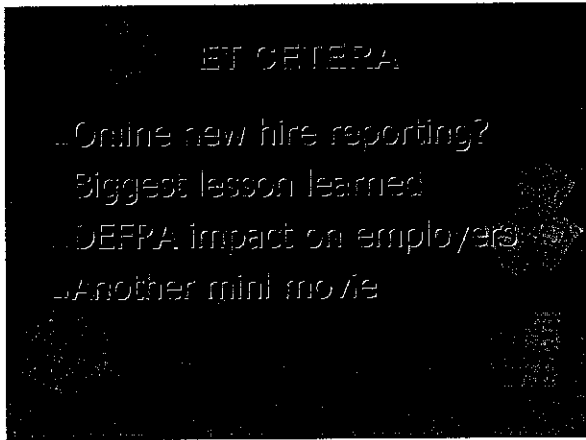

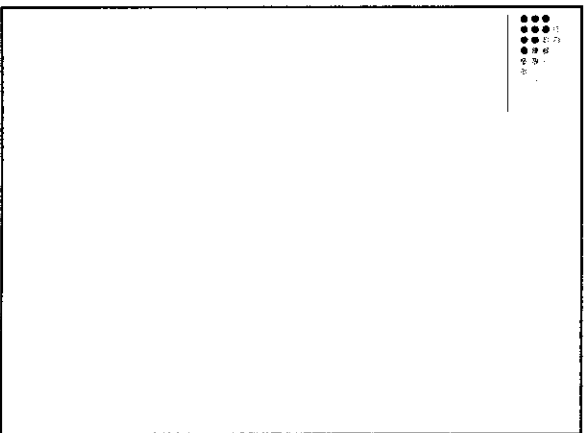


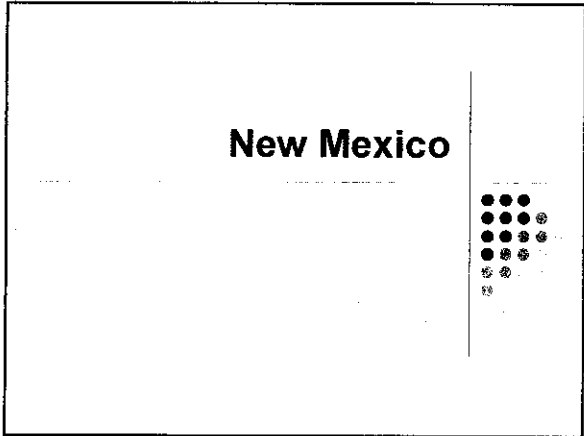


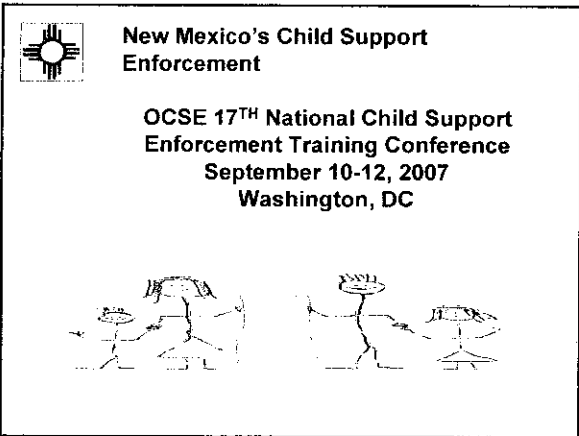


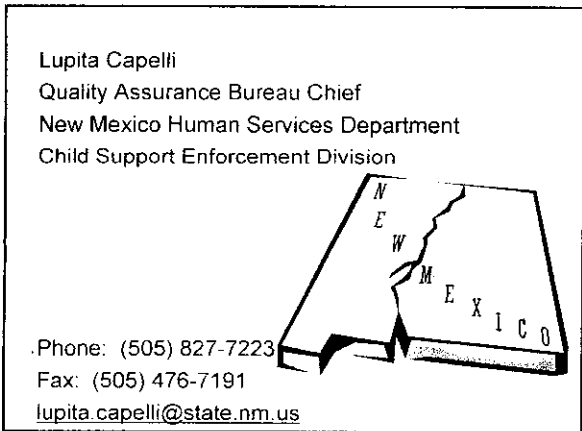












eEmployer

The New Mexico Human Services Department developed and implemented the "eEmployer" website in April, 2003.

The eEmployer Web site is accessed through a front-end, publicly accessible portal "eLink", which provides citizens and employers access to online systems in the New Mexico Human Services Department.

The eEmployer website is designed to simplify the communication between employers and the New Mexico Child Support Enforcement Division. Using eEmployer, employers can:

- Keep address and contact information for each business location up to date
- Specify appropriate addresses for different types of correspondence, including 3rd party addresses
- Maintain insurance plans offered
- Update employee and dependent insurance coverage information*
- Keep employment records current for employees under court order to provide child support*
- Provide employee address information*
- Set up automatic withdrawal for court ordered wage withholding*
- Respond to Verification of Employment Letters
- * Only employees with active support orders can be added to the website

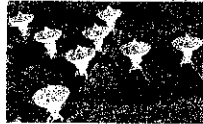

- The "eLink", also allows you to access the eCSE Web site. eCSE gives child support customers (CPs and NCPs) access to apply online for child support services, inquire about child support payment status, view payment history, provide address and/or employer updates, provide "leads" on non-custodial parents, and utilize direct deposit or automatic withdrawal.



Architecture

- eCSE is written in VB.NET and ASP.NET. Data is stored in SQL Server 2000 databases. Both eCSE and the New Mexico Child Support Enforcement Division's "eEmployer" site utilize web services to perform functions that are common to both sites. Both sites use File Transfer Protocol (FTP) to transfer information to and from the Mainframe, which are processed on a daily basis in order to maintain data integrity between the New Mexico Child Support Enforcement Division's mainframe computer system and the eCSE website.

Chimayo – In 1810 Bernardo Abeyta, a farmer, was praying and claimed to see a light emanating from the soil. Upon investigation he found a cross, that is now kept at the altar inside the chapel. Legend maintains that the earth surrounding this cross has healing power. Many pilgrims come to touch the dirt in a pit inside the chapel, where castoff crutches and braces line the walls.



Abuquerque Balloon Fiesta, October 5-8 - The Alb. Balloon Fiesta is perhaps the most photographed event in the world.



Taos Pueblo – Has two multiple-storied adobe dwelling that reflect a culture hundreds of years old. This pueblo is at the base of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains, and is one of the oldest continuously inhabited communities in North America.



The Santa Fe Indian Market- August 18 and 19, 2007, is the biggest event in Santa Fe when a population of 65,000 plus grows by another 100,000 visitors. Each August, the historic city of Santa Fe, NM becomes the Santa Fe Indian Market, enveloping the town's central Plaza and surrounding streets.



VLA Very Large Array – Is one of the world's premier radio space observatories, the VLA telescope consists of 27 dish antennas, each weighing 230 tons and measuring 82 feet in diameter. For optimum tracking, they can be maneuvered along a Y-shaped grid of railroad tracks that stretch for miles across the desert floor.



Bandelier National Monument – This 50-square mile monument is on the Pajarito Plateau in the rugged canyon and mesa county of northern New Mexico. Remnants of an Ancestral Pueblo community established 7 or 8 centuries ago include pueblo and cliff dwellings.



White Sands - At the northern end of the Chihuahuan Desert lies a mountain ringed valley called the Tularosa Basin. Rising from the heart of this basin is one of the world's great natural wonders - the glistening white sands of New Mexico. White Sands is the source of rare gypsum sands that form snow-white dunes rising up to 60 feet, covering 275 square miles of Tularosa Basin floor.
