IN RE COMPLAINT AGAINST A JUDICIAL OFFICER

MEMORANDUM

Complainant maintains that, 40 years ago, when complainant was 9 years old, a person who is now a federal judge (and would have been a teenager at the time) approached him on the street while he was playing in front of his home. According to complainant, "none of the voicings by hereon aforestated non-customary supposedly female, were to ascertain whether minor child [complainant] existed as lost." Moreover, the person who approached him and said, among other things, "i'm a student", "lacked [complainant's] parent(s) permission and/or authorization and/or consent for the encounter and subsequent interface."

Complainant believes that the judge "as an array of legalistical education, should now provide the exact previous encounter chronology." But the Judicial Conduct and Disability Act of 1980 is not concerned with casual encounters of children long ago. Nothing in the complaint is even remotely related to the business of the federal courts, and it is therefore dismissed as outside the scope of the Act, which addresses only "conduct prejudicial to the effective and expeditious administration of the business of the courts". 28 U.S.C. §351(a).
