## Veterans Health Administration Warning System Published by VA Central Office

April 28, 2004

Item: Drug File view from CPRS

Specific Incident: A provider misunderstood an order, and selected a "pharmacy use only"

product on the CPRS menu that reached a patient resulting in significant

patient harm.

General Information: Facility drug files may contain entries that are for pharmacy use only.

Some of these entries may be inappropriate or harmful for patient administration. In addition, some items are in the drug file for inventory

management purposes only.

Some examples include:

Pharmacy bulk packages (antibiotics, electrolytes, etc.)

• Sterile water for injection.

• Chemicals (hydrochloric acids, trichloracetic acid, sulfur, etc.)

Solvents and preservatives

Pharmacy related supplies not used/sent to patients.

Recommendations:

- Facility pharmacy staff should review the CPRS drug file listings to identify products that are inappropriate for clinical use, and then work with IRM to RESTRICT these products on a case by case basis, from view of the providers. Restricting the products in CPRS file 101.43 prevents providers from seeing them but will permit pharmacy staff access to them through the back door CHUI interface.
- If a restricted product is needed for clinical patient use, incorporate the item in a quick order instead, thus removing the potential of misprescribing.
