

#### GLOBAL OVERSIGHT



The Department of Defense Inspector General is responsible for oversight of a global Department. The DoD IG is committed to promoting integrity, accountability, and improvement of DoD personnel, programs and operations. Listed to the right are highlights of DoD IG work and initiatives to provide oversight to the Department as of September 30, 2008.

#### Comprehensive Audit Plan

In coordination with the Southwest Asia Joint Planning Group, the DoD IG issued a Comprehensive Audit Plan for Southwest Asia. The plan was designed to outline specific areas of oversight responsibility.

#### **Opening of New Field Offices**

As part of our plan to increase our global oversight of the Department, we opened field offices in Korea and Germany. The field offices are for the audit component, and are located in Seoul and Stuttgart.

#### **Defective Military Products**

Armament & Technical Products (a division of General Dynamics) agreed to pay the U.S. Government \$4.1 million as a result of a qui tam settlement. Based on information from former employees, an investigation found that General Dynamics fraudulently certified test results for heat-treating on High Data Rate masts that are used on U.S. Navy submarines.

#### **DCIS Asset Forfeiture Program**

The Defense Criminal Investigative Service has obtained over \$21 million dollars in court ordered forfeitures and an additional \$8.6 million in seizures as of September 30, 2008.

#### Review of Electrocutions in Iraq

As a result of congressional requests, the DoD IG is conducting a systematic review of electrocution deaths in Iraq that have occurred since 2003. The team has reviewed 75,000 documents and interviewed over 35 witnesses.

#### **Munitions Accountability**

The DoD IG evaluated munitions accountability in Afghanistan and followed up on a previous report on munitions accountability in Iraq. The two evaluations further examined the responsiveness of security assistance processes that were providing equipment to the Afghan and Iraqi Security Forces, and the planning, development, and mentoring of logistics and medical sustainment for the Afghan and Iraqi Security Forces.

#### **DoD Funding to Pakistan**

The DoD IG is assessing DoD-funded programs in support of the Government of Pakistan, such as Coalition Support Funds. Within three weeks after receiving a request from the Secretary of Defense, the DoD IG deployed a team to Pakistan to visit organizations and individuals who were responsible for the management of these programs.

#### **Oversight Growth Plan**

After considerable analysis in looking at the Department and its role in the Global War on Terror among other global responsibilities, the DoD IG developed a growth plan to increase by 33 percent to 1,918 full-time equivalents by FY 2015 in order to boost manpower capability in the face of a continually growing Department.

#### **OIF and OEF Challenges**

The DoD IG issued a report detailing 302 audit reports and testimornies regarding the challenges impacting Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom reported by major oversight organizations from FY 2003 to 2007.

#### DOD MAJOR CHALLENGES

Responding to the war on terrorism's demands, carrying on daily training operations in the United States and around the globe, and transforming to meet the needs of the 21st Century.

#### DOD CONTRACTOR AUDIT

On May 29, 2008, the DoD IG issued a report on the "Effect of Payments on Boeing Pension Funds on Economic Price Adjustment Clauses in DoD Contracts." The Boeing Company's pension fund contributions were able to abnormally influence an economic price adjustment factor that would have resulted in higher payments to Boeing on three multiyear contracts: the Air Force C-17 Globemaster III aircraft, the Army AH-64D Apache Longbow helicopter, and the Navy F/A-18 E/F Super Hornet aircraft. The Director, Defense Procurement and Acquisition Policy and his negotiating team



reached a settlement with Boeing for \$272.3 million resulting in a cost avoidance of \$520.6 million for DoD and the taxpayers.


# STATUS OF TRAINING VEHICLES FOR U.S. GROUND FORCES AUDIT

On August 6, 2008, the DoD IG issued a report on "Status of Training Vehicles for U.S. Ground Forces Deploying in Support of Operation Iraqi Freedom." The DoD IG identified that competing requirements for equipment in theater as well as units being reset for redeployment have created challenges for combat training centers.



On April 9, 2008, the DoD IG issued a report on "Training Requirements for U.S. Ground Forces Deploying in Support of Operation Iraqi Freedom." The DoD IG identified that U.S. Central Command requires that all personnel deploying in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom be trained in 14 areas, which are listed above. As a result, the services provided realistic, theater inspired training for units deploying in support of OIF.



#### AEY AMMUNITION INVESTIGATION

A joint investigation involving the Defense Criminal Investigative Service and other law enforcement agencies led to the indictment of four persons for attempting to defraud the government on a \$298 million contract to supply ammunition to Afghan National Army and Afghan security forces. The contract, issued January 26, 2007, by the U.S. Army to Defense contractor AEY, located in Miami Beach, Florida, stipulated that the company was required to certify that it was providing serviceable and safe ammunition. The contract also prohibited delivery of ammunition acquired, directly or indirectly, from any military companies in China.
