Other FY 2002 Results

OSC met the majority of its annual performance goals for FY 2002. Accomplishment of all goals was affected by the fact that OSC's Disclosure Unit received a record 555 disclosures – many involving matters of public safety and national security – for possible referral to the agency concerned during FY 2002, compared to 380 in FY 2001. As public awareness of the Disclosure Unit has grown in recent years, disclosures filed, and referrals to agencies pursuant to § 1213, have steadily increased. As a result of the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001, OSC has received many complex national security disclosures, some involving involved complex and sensitive classified material that have required the work of more than one attorney. The Disclosure Unit has played an increasingly important role in triggering investigations of dangers to public health and safety.

The addition of two employees to the Disclosure Unit during FY 2001 helped OSC process more referrals to agencies in FY 2002 than in prior years:

Nevertheless, as of September 30, 2002, 534 cases were pending in the Disclosure Unit (up from 245 one year earlier). Approximately 25% of the cases were over one year old; and approximately 13% had been designated after initial review as involving the highest priority of disclosure case (a substantial and specific danger to public health and safety) and likely referral to the agency head.
