Dear Friend.

For many Americans, 2008 has been a challenging and difficult year. I have talked with families struggling in this economy – struggling to get a new job, pay for health care, meet rising food costs, and put their children through college. I have met with soldiers in Afghanistan and Iraq – two wars that have gone on longer than the Second World War and whose costs we will be paying for decades to come. And many Central New Jersey residents worry about the direction the nation is headed.

As others have said, this is no ordinary time. Yet, this country has overcome grave challenges before, and we will do so again. My faith in the ability of Americans to rise to challenges is sustained by our representative form of government – the greatest the world has ever seen. Our democratic system is not the quickest in short-term response, but in the long term we have always progressed as a nation as we constantly strive to form a more perfect union.

As your representative, I value our communication and need to hear from you about the issues that affect you and your family. This report – including the map – is designed to provide an idea of what your representative can do and what services I can provide. Some of my work is conducted in Washington, giving voice to your concerns and voting on issues that affect the 700,000 residents who live in the 44 towns and five counties that comprise the 12th Congressional District. To address some local concerns, I obtained, among other things, funding for the Land and Water Conservation Fund to preserve open spaces; helped free middle-income families from the unfair Alternative Minimum Tax, which hits taxpayers in New Jersey more than any other state; secured \$400 million for improved transit security; and helped pass a new GI Bill that gives a full four-year education to troops and veterans of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, including members of the New Jersey National Guard.

However, a representative does much more than just vote in Washington. This report provides examples of responses to various needs that people have brought before me.

As we continue to confront the challenges that face our nation, our state, and our region, I need to hear from you. I look forward to hearing from you, whether by phone (toll-free at 1-87-RUSH-HOLT), e-mail (through www.holt.house.gov), or in person in Washington or in your community. Thank you.
