ACCIDENT INVESTIGATION STATUS REPORT



In 2003, 39 NTSB Aviation Safety Investigators investigated approximately 2,059 general aviation (GA) accidents and incidents. Each month, the Safety Board releases final

reports on those GA investigations via our aviation accident database. Beginning this month, the NTSB will provide each congressional office and transportation related committee with a report detailing accident investigation releases by state.

"We are pleased to initiate this new outreach program for Members of Congress and their staff," said Chairman Ellen Engleman Conners. "We hope that this tool will be helpful to them when their constituents call for information and updates on accidents in their districts."

To support electronic government initiatives, the report will be emailed. It will include the date and city of the of the accident, and there will be a link to our public website, which not only includes these most recent investigations, but also contains information back to 1962 about civil aviation accidents.

The task force reports to the Department of Defense Safety Oversight Council, and is part of the Defense Department's effort to achieve a 50% reduction in avoidable fatal accidents by the end of FY05.
