From a variety of backgrounds, they apply their professional knowledge and experience towards NTSB policy issues and the interaction of industry and government to turn the findings of our professional investigators into safety improvements for the traveling public.

Our aviation safety experience measures over 2000 man-years. Our aviation accident experts, along with our expert investigators in rail, marine, pipeline, hazmat and highway, are career professionals who investigate over 2,000 accidents a year. The most complex investigations can consume 5,000 to 25,000 manhours. Through their relentless dedication, our investigators show that they have a mission -- not a job.

So, to answer your question, the world's best air crash investigators are alive and well, at the National Transportation Safety Board.

# NTSB launches on two helicopter and one rail accident

The NTSB's South Central Regional Office in Arlington, Texas launched on two helicopter accidents in Texas this week. On March 21st, a Bell 407 air ambulance helicopter crashed near Pyote, killing four people and seriously injuring one. The team included Investigator-in-Charge **Aaron Sauer, Erik Grosof** from Transportation Disaster Assistance and Meteorologist **Don Eick.** 

On March 23rd, a Sikorsky S-76A, enroute to an offshore drilling ship, crashed in the Gulf of Mexico killing two pilots and eight passengers. **Lorenda Ward** has been named Investigator-in-Charge.

The Office of Railroad, Pipeline and Hazardous Materials launched an investigation into the allision of two Metra locomotives in Chicago, Illinois.

The Office of Research and Engineering released preliminary aviation accident statistics for 2003, which


showed an increase in several civil aviation categories.
