

# **Aviation Investigator Wins Two Awards**

The NTSB is pleased to announce that one of its safety investigators has received two significant aviation awards. George Petterson, of the NTSB's Southwest Regional Office in Gardena, California, has received an Aviation Week and Space Technology Laureate Award for his investigation into the 2002 in-flight wing failure of a U.S. Forest Service C-130 firefighting aircraft. The NTSB determined that the probable cause of the wing failure was metal fatigue in an area hidden by a doubler. The findings of this crash, and two others attributed to fatigue failure, led to the U.S. Forest Service grounding the air tanker fleet.

In addition to this, the Federal Aviation Administration



(FAA) will present George with the Charles Taylor "Master Mechanic" award on March 18th. He will be recognized for his 52 years in aviation maintenance as well as his work in providing presentations to FAA sponsored mechanic

#### **NTSB Works Afghanistan Crash**



NTSB investigators are continuing work on the February 3rd crash of a Kam Air Boeing 737 in the mountains near Kabul, Afghanistan. Four investigators were deployed to assist the Afghan government in their investigation of the crash, which occurred at the top of an 11,000 foot mountain 10 miles east of Kabul.

# **Highway Investigators Launch to Florida Crash**

The Office of Highway Safety (HS) launched to the crash of a tanker truck in Davie, FL on February 11th. The truck, loaded with 9,000 gallons of gasoline, overturned on an exit ramp transitioning from I-595 onto the Florida Turnpike. A 2001 Mercury Sable station wagon, which was pinned beneath the tanker during the accident, caught fire when gasoline from the truck ignited, killing the four occupants. The truck driver also received severe burn injuries in the crash.

The team of seven is being led by Senior Highway Investigator Gary Van Etten and includes Robert Accetta, Mark Bagnard, Ron Kaminski, Pete Kotowski, Paula Sind-Prunier and Larry Yohe.

# TDA Course Gets High Marks

The Office of Transportation Disaster Assistance (TDA) received high marks from attendees to their latest course at the NTSB Academy. The three day course, titled "Transportation Disaster Response - Family Assistance", covered issues surrounding families of victims of transportation disasters. The 63 domestic and international transportation specialists who attended the course gave it the highest marks of any Academy course so far, with an average score of 4.8 out of 5.0 for course content and usefulness, and instructor knowledge. This is the tenth Academy course delivered by TDA, with over 320 students trained.
