



Indonesia Program Summary

Indonesia's program is helping to reduce corruption in the judiciary, providing support for the Anti-Corruption Commission, enhancing the performance of the Financial Transaction Reports and Analysis Center, and developing pilot e-procurement systems in five provinces. The program is also helping Indonesia build a robust and sustainable immunization system in difficult to reach areas.

★ In an effort to discourage money laundering activities, , the
Indonesia Financial Intelligence Unit launched a successful
public campaign in June for non-bank financial institutions,
including money changers, insurance companies, finance and

- ★ State-of-the-art audio-visual recording equipment was provided to the Indonesia Corruption Eradication Commission (KPK) so that corruption trials in the regions can be monitored by five partner universities.
- ★ The National Joint Expanded Program for Immunization Cluster Survey for 2007-2008 was completed and shows an increase in the national routine immunization coverage rate from 71 percent to 78 percent.

★ With MCC Threshold Program assistance, all 68 project districts have implemented annual Expanded Program for Immunization action plans. Seventy nine percent of these districts have now implemented Local Area Monitoring tools for improved immunization coverage. Data show that 2.8 million children under the age of one (56 percent of the 5.1 million targeted) have been immunized with measles and DPT3 vaccines in MCC and Indonesia Immunization Project provinces. Sixty nine percent of the almost 10,000 targeted health officials have completed immunization program management, supportive supervision, and vaccine supply management training.
