MEDLINEplus for Migrant Farm Workers: Implications for Health Care Providers

Introduction

Migrant farm workers encounter a diverse variety of health problems including occupational illnesses and chronic diseases. (1) Finding high quality, plain-language, and reliable materials is challenging for health care workers who provide health care information to farm workers, their family members and friends.(2, 3) A useful tool for finding that information is the MEDLINEplus.gov web site, now also available in Spanish. This poster will highlight features of MEDLINEplus so that health care providers can meet the information needs of migrant farm workers.(4)



Focus of Study

Health care providers including community health workers, community health promoters, peer educators, and promotoras as well as nurses, physician assistants, and doctors provide health information to migrant farm workers.(5) Given the large number of health related web sites, it is difficult to choose quality web sites.(6) MEDLINEplus was created by the National Library of Medicine to make quality information easily accessible for individuals. MEDLINEplus is organized by health topics and currently includes information on over 590 topics. Other features include an illustrated medical encyclopedia, interactive health tutorials, a database of full-text drug information and the latest health news.

Interactive Health Tutorials


