WELCOME: JUDITH BAILEY

MS. BAILEY: Good morning, everybody, and welcome to the second day of the FTC's 90th Anniversary Symposium. Once again, it's a beautiful day. It's a great day to think about 90 years of FTC history.

My name is Judith Bailey. I'm the Deputy Executive Director of the Agency, and the Chairman of these 90th Anniversary events. We had a full day of panels yesterday with terrific topics, thought-provoking discussions, and a great dinner last night. Some of us are a little bleary eyed as a result, but we'll soldier on anyway.

I would like to start out with just a few administrative details about the symposium. First, security. We have fire exits through the main doors in the front of the building on New Jersey Avenue and also through the pantry area next to the G Street corridor and out onto G Street. In the event of any emergency, which we surely hope doesn't happen, proceed to the Union Life Building diagonally across Massachusetts Avenue.
