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DOLORES HARRIS: **** Nevada 89001. Well, I would just say from reading the Federal Register here I would just like to address this, like where it says, "Radiological releases. The potential impacts (i.e., latent cancer fatalities) to the public and workers from potential 5 6 7 8 radiological releases during routine loading of 9 10 canisters and transportation casks at the commercial sites, and from handling and disposal operations at the repository." There was a suggestion that this 11 12 would be looked into by the Department of Energy; is 13 that right? I agree with this totally, and would urge that this would be done. It's the Federal Register. These are suggestions like that these things would be looked into and studied. And I 14 15 16 17 wanted to say that I agree with this. 18 And I was living in Ireland when the 19 Chernobyl disaster happened, and that I would hope 20 21

that you look into, when you're looking into this, that you look into what they studied at Chernobyl and all the stuff that came out of it. So I would like to say that I really would like, you know, me personally, have this looked into.

The other thing is: "Transportation. potential radiological and non-radiological impacts (i.e., traffic injuries and fatalities) to the public and workers associated with the shipment of materials to the repository under the mostly rail scenario."
That that would be looked into, studied and a provision made for potential like accidents that might happen, and again that the Chernobyl studies would be studied and taken into account.

"Acci dents. The other thing is: potential radiologic impacts to workers and the public from reasonably foreseeable accidents during loading of canisters at the sites, transportation and repository operations, including any accidents with

low probability but high potential consequences."

So even things that say, Oh, that's never going to happen, you know, like that would be looked into too. Like the people said, Not probable, yet possi bl e.

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And again there, you know, like you can imagine, I'm sure you've already probably seen some of this, I was in Ireland, like I say, when the Chernobyl thing happened. And we didn't even know what was going on. I remember red dots like on all our carrots. We didn't know what it was. Neighbors'

children hair fell out. Sheep dropped dead on the mountains, you know what I mean. It was a cursory kind of investigation. It was all kind of hushed up.

Since that I've looked at information and I've been absolutely appalled at some of the statistics. Seven million people were affected. within a week the entire world, Japan, the United States and everywhere else was impacted by it. Ar the incidents of thyroid cancer increased 2400 percent.

You know, like so I would really like when this has been looked into I suggest that the Chernobyl study would be studied in depth.

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Sabotage is a big thing. Like I think because of the terrorist activity in the world and because the United States is a target for most countries who don't enjoy freedom. And to put like what has been described as a mobile Chernobyl on the road or on the rail and bring it across such a vast area to me is just like throwing a party for every terrorist in the world.

"Sabotage. The potential radiological impacts to workers and the public from sabotage of transportation and repository operations." like that just screams of terrorism and terrorists

attacks. You just can't keep things like that quiet.
Anyway, the other one then is another
Federal Register. "Potential impacts to the general public and workers from radiologic exposures from potential accidents during operations of the railroad." Like when it would be shipped. Like I'm totally against it.

There's no point in going into politics of it because I know that it has been ruled that it is to be done and that you're only doing your job in the DOE, so there's no point in even going off on a tangent about that. But I do think, I'm praying, if all else fails, pray that it won't come to pass. But if it does I really think it's imperative that these are only a small amount of what would have to be really, really tight in case that there was an acci dent.

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
