Suspensions (8 bills):

- 1) **H.R. 627** – To designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 40 Putnam Avenue in Hamden, Connecticut, as the "Linda White-Epps Post Office" (*Rep. DeLauro – Government Reform*)
- 2) **H.R. 1760** – To designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 215 Martin Luther King, Jr. Boulevard in Madison, Wisconsin, as the "Robert M. La Follette, Sr. Post Office Building" (*Rep. Baldwin – Government Reform*)
- 3) **H.Res. 266** – Supporting the goals and ideals of Peace Officers Memorial Day (*Rep. Hefley – Government Reform*)
- 4) **H.R. 1046** – To authorize the Secretary of the Interior to contract with the city of Cheyenne, Wyoming, for the storage of the city's water in the Kendrick Project, Wyoming (*Rep. Cubin – Resources*)
- 5) **H.R. 485** – Potash Royalty Reduction Act of 2005 (*Rep. Pearce – Resources*)
- 6) **H.R. 2107** – National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Maintenance Fund Act of 2005 (*Rep. Saxton – Resources*)
