## Other Federal Actions

1. Promulgation of "A Program for Reducing the National Flood Damage Potential," Senate Committee on Public Works Print (1959) 86th Congress, 1st Section (Senate Select Committee on National Water Resources), circulated the experience of TVA in canvassing alternative measures of flood damage reduction.
2. Report by the Committee on Banking and Currency, United States Senate, Insurance and Other Programs for Financial Assistance to Flood Victims, September 1966.
3. House Document 461, A Unified National Program for Managing Flood Losses cogently presented the costly results of depending almost exclusively on a structural means of reducing flood damage and recommended implementation of a strategy employing multiple means.

Executive Order 11296 (1966) directed Federal agencies responsible for siting and constructing Federal facilities to avoid use of areas subjected to flooding and wherever practical to floodproof existing facilities in the flood plain. Federal agencies responsible for issuing loans, grants and mortgage insurance were directed to use their influence to discourage the uneconomic, hazardous and/or unnecessary use of flood-prone lands.
