The extension of the comment period on the "Supplement to Yucca Mountain Repository Environmental Impact Statement" provides yet another delay in activating the repository. Environmental impact study after environmental impact study have been submitted to your office by the most respected organizations during the past four years. The casks for holding the nuclear waste material have been designed and successfully tested under the most rigorous conditions.

As you know, Yucca Mountain has been considered safe and secure by those performing the studies.
