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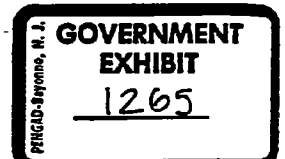

Voice-over: "It was a time of passion. A time of romance. A time of rebooting."

Music: Timpani drums rumble.

Shot: A young woman in period costume is fretfully sifting through software and spare parts, trying to figure out which products to vote for.

Voice-over: "At that one moment in history when someone had to take a stand-"

Shot: Montage of peasants storming the Bastille, the Battleship Potemkin being captured by the proletariat, users pelting Bill Gates with Mac floppies, etc.

Voice-over: "thousands raised their voices in unison and shook a sleeping nation to its senses, crying, 'It's Microsoft, stupid!'"

OK, maybe we're exaggerating the impact of this year's Readers' Choice Awards just a bit. But for the third year in a row, thousands of Computer Currents readers stormed the windmills of computer industry hype and political correctness and gave them a big, fat raspberry. In an election-year, Clintonesque turn of events, readers who trust Bill Gates about as much as they trust that

other Bill nonetheless gave Microsoft products an overwhelming roar of approval. This may not be a revelation, but ponder the following numbers and then call your stockbroker.

In 1994, Microsoft won nine categories, took second in five, and placed in nine. The 1995 numbers were almost identical. But this year, Microsoft clearly owns the hearts and desktops of our readers: The company received nine first places, nine second places, and nine other places. Look carefully in some categories and you'll often see Microsoft won by a landslide, while some poor wretch (often a former software colossus) scooped up the crumbs.

One might conclude Microsoft has bamboozled everyone on the planet. Justice Department aside, I don't think that's the case. While a number of other vendors managed to win a category or two, Microsoft owns the software market. The only reason-aside from a very powerful marketing arm-is Microsoft products work well. In categories where it once did poorly, such as Project Management, Presentations, Database, and Service/Support, Microsoft hitched up its polyester pants and got down to work. It listened to users, revamped interfaces, and turned so-so products into winners. This is one name brand that's earned its good name.

It's a trend you see repeated across the spectrum of votes. On the hardware side, you'll see familiar names from last year: HP, IBM, Dell, Gateway, and Western Digital. Quality sells with Computer Currents readers.

BEYOND MICROSOFT?

But even if Microsoft and a handful of hardware megacorps own the market, there are some intriguing hints of things to come. For starters, not everything is velvet in the world of St. Bill. A paradigm shift is here. Desktop computers and traditional online services are being left behind in favor of small, handheld computers-cum-communicators and the free-wheeling Internet. Sift through the results and you'll see Internet programs like Netscape and Eudora popping their heads up. Check out the new Web Browser category and you'll discover it garnered the third highest number of votes of all the categories.

And what of the much-hyped Windows 95? While it easily captured the operating system category (more than doubling its votes from last year), votes for applications tell a somewhat different story. In the Word processor, Spreadsheet, Database, Draw, and Presentation categories-areas that Microsoft owns-a hefty minority of readers are sticking with Windows 3.1 versions. This statistic mirrors market surveys that show consumers are enthusiastically upgrading to Win-dows 95 while businesses, especially big businesses, are not.

There are fewer surprises in the hardware section, but one thing seems clear: Consumers are becoming a big force in the market. For example, Gateway's Family PC line took the top Desktop prize. Small office/home office printers like the LaserJet 5P and Stylus Color inkjet dominate, and fast CD-ROM drives and 32-bit sound cards (for games and home titles) are de rigueur. Cheapie scanners and digital cameras are suddenly in view, and cozy online services like America Online are overwhelmingly popular.

BY THE NUMBERS

Before you stroll through the Readers' Choice results, here are a few background notes for your amusement. We tabulated every ballot we received by the deadline. Three ballots were chosen at random; those lucky readers won some fabulous prizes. (For more envy-inducement, check out the accompanying sidebars by Doug Dineley.) The vendors that took first place in their categories not only get a stunning trophy and a firm handshake, they can also use the Readers' Choice logo for marketing and product packaging. Look for the RCA logo. It's your mark of quality.

As for the results, we've noted how many readers voted in a given category. Within that pool of votes, we've identified what percentage each company received. For example, in the Word processor category, 81 percent of all the ballots we received cast a vote for a word processing program. Of those votes, Word 7 received 47 percent.

MOVERS, SHAKERS, AND QUAKERS

If you're ready for raw data, go ahead and jump to our RCA winners list. But here are a few thoughts for the armchair analyst within.

- Vote splitting. Word 7, Excel 7, and Access 7 take the prizes, but a cadre of users are sticking with Windows 3.1 versions of these programs.
- Shareware rules. In General communications and elsewhere, shareware and former shareware products continue to stake a claim, thanks in large part to the Internet boom. Procomm Plus for Windows 95, thanks to its kitchen sink Web browser suite of modules, is top dog. Eudora, competent and cheap, is an email favorite. And WinZip takes the shareware crown from PKZip, it's inspiration.
- Been there, done that. The Web browser wars are over. Netscape won. Or Microsoft will. Next!
- It's a Web Web Web Web World. Internet email, Web browsers, Windows NT (a favorite for intranet setups), and 33.6Kbps modems all receive your votes for the first time.
- Big Blue Boo Hoo. IBM's positively-reviewed Aptiva barely makes the Desktop system list. And OS/2 receives even less votes this year, dropping from seven to three percent.
- Make it simple, stupid! PageMaker's 1995 lead over Microsoft Publisher shrinks by 16 percent. Paint Shop Pro is nipping at Photoshop's heels. The message: simple is good.
- Stay awake! PKWare, creator of the beloved DOS-based PKZip, watches its hold evaporate while others--notably Niko Mak's WinZip--create easy-to-use Windows versions. PKWare's PKZip for Windows finally shipped this month.
- Maybe they should rename the company Kumquat. Apple continues to slide. System 7.x slips three percentage points this year, not a single PowerMac makes the desktop computer cut, the PowerBook moves from first to last in the Notebook category, and the Newton faces a serious challenge from a U.S. Robotics PDA. (The irony is the U.S. Robotics Pilot is strictly an organizer; it

doesn't offer any communications features. Does this modem manufacturer know something Apple doesn't?)

- Zip Zip Hooray! The people speak: By unofficial proclamation, the Iomega Zip drive is the PC/Mac floppy drive of the '90s. Everyone else can go home.
- No Scan Scam. The cheap scanners arrive: Paperport, Pagescan, and Vista. More are coming. Check out our January buyers' guide from scanmeister Bob Weibel for the details.
- CompuServe is dead, long live CompuServe! Beloved by techies and shunned by new users, CompuServe gets routed by America Online for the second year in a row. In 1994, CIS and AOL were roughly tied. This year, AOL takes 73 percent of the votes. P.S. The Microsoft Network (MSN) triples its votes this year, vaulting to, um, third place with three percent of the vote.
- We're all dummies on this bus. IDG's Dummies series takes top prize for the third year running (thanks, no doubt, in part to such titles as "Golf for Dummies," "Sex for Dummies," and "Ventriloquism for Dummies"), demonstrating once again that there's too much stuff to learn about computers.
