◆ 2005 NASA Occupational Health Conference

◆ Agency One NASA Peer Award: Guy Camomilli of the Office of the Health and Medical Officer received recognition at the NASA Agency Awards ceremony on April 27th as the first One NASA Peer Award winner for NASA HQ along with Mike McNeill, Office of the Environmental Management Division and Art Lee, Office of Safety and Mission Assurance. They were recognized for the Agency Audit Evaluation Team "for their collaboration across departments to reduce time and manpower impact on Centers during audits." This team established the office of primary responsibility for various aspects of health, safety, and environmental policies, processes, and operations during center audits. This minimizes the chance of redundancy, targets the appropriate subject matter experts to address their areas of expertise and collectively minimizes the amount of time the center and auditor have to devote to any one area. This award was chosen as the Best Center Award for NASA HQ and was considered for the Agency Best of the Best One NASA Award. The One NASA Peer Award provides a vehicle for recognizing individuals and teams who demonstrate One NASA behaviors under one or more of the following themes: Making decisions for the common good; Collaborating to leverage existing capabilities, and Standardizing to achieve efficiencies.

◆ OH Web Update: The agency OH website continues to be transformed as our office strives to enhance the website with current and relevant information for all of the NASA OH
