## Summary of Federal Recovery Assistance to New York January 17, 2002

Congress appropriated \$40 billion in emergency supplemental funds to respond to the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001 (P.L. 107-38). Of these sums, \$10 billion was made available to the President to spend immediately at his discretion; \$10 billion was made available to the President to spend with 15 days advance notice to Congress; and the final \$20 billion was subject to further appropriation by Congress. The legislation further specified that not less than half of these funds were to be used for recovery efforts in New York, Virginia, and Pennsylvania. Congress appropriated the final \$20 billion as a supplemental addition to the 2002 Defense Appropriations bill (P.L. 107-117).

The New York Delegation developed a \$20 billion proposal to address the most immediate needs in the Metro area. The chart below compares that proposal with the provisions that were enacted in P.L. 107-117.
