12 mentation determined by the Secretary of Defense to
13 adequately account for the support provided, and
14 such determination is final and conclusive upon the
15 accounting officers of the United States, and 15
16 days following notification to the appropriate con-
17 gressional committees: *Provided further,* That the
18 Secretary of Defense shall provide quarterly reports
19 to the congressional defense committees on the use
20 of funds provided in this paragraph:
21 *Provided further,* That of the amount available under this
22 heading for the Defense Contract Management Agency,
23 \$52,000,000 shall remain available until September 30,
24 2009.

5 the authority to provide assistance under this heading is
6 in addition to any other authority to provide assistance
7 to foreign nations: *Provided further*, That the Secretary
8 of Defense may transfer such funds to appropriations for
9 military personnel; operation and maintenance; Overseas
10 Humanitarian, Disaster, and Civic Aid; procurement; re-
11 search, development, test and evaluation; and defense
12 working capital funds to accomplish the purposes provided
13 herein: *Provided further*, That this transfer authority is
14 in addition to any other transfer authority available to the
15 Department of Defense: *Provided further*, That upon a de-
16 termination that all or part of the funds so transferred
17 from this appropriation are not necessary for the purposes
18 provided herein, such amounts may be transferred back
19 to this appropriation: *Provided further*, That contributions
20 of funds for the purposes provided herein from any person,
21 foreign government, or international organization may be
22 credited to this Fund, and used for such purposes: *Pro-*
23 *vided further*, That the Secretary shall notify the congres-
24 sional defense committees in writing upon the receipt and
25 upon the transfer of any contribution delineating the

1 sources and amounts of the funds received and the specific
2 use of such contributions: *Provided further*, That the Sec-
3 retary of Defense shall, not fewer than 15 days prior to
4 making transfers from this appropriation account, notify
5 the congressional defense committees in writing of the de-
6 tails of any such transfer: *Provided further*, That the Sec-
7 retary shall submit a report no later than 30 days after
8 the end of each fiscal quarter to the congressional defense
9 committees summarizing the details of the transfer of
10 funds from this appropriation.

21 GENERAL PROVISIONS, THIS CHAPTER

22 SEC. 9101. Appropriations provided in this chapter
23 are available for obligation until September 30, 2008, un-
24 less otherwise provided in this chapter.

1 SEC. 9102. Notwithstanding any other provision of
2 law, funds made available in this chapter are in addition
3 to amounts appropriated or otherwise made available for
4 the Department of Defense for fiscal year 2008.

5 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

6 SEC. 9103. Upon the determination of the Secretary
7 of Defense that such action is necessary in the national
8 interest, the Secretary may transfer between appropria-
9 tions up to \$2,500,000,000 of the funds made available
10 to the Department of Defense in this chapter: *Provided*,
11 That the Secretary shall notify the Congress promptly of
12 each transfer made pursuant to the authority in this sec-
13 tion: *Provided further*, That the authority provided in this
14 section is in addition to any other transfer authority avail-
15 able to the Department of Defense and is subject to the
16 same terms and conditions as the authority provided in
17 section 8005 of Public Law 110–116, except for the fourth
18 proviso.

19 SEC. 9104. (a) From funds made available for oper-
20 ation and maintenance in this chapter to the Department
21 of Defense, not to exceed \$1,026,841,000 may be used,
22 notwithstanding any other provision of law, to fund the
23 Commander's Emergency Response Program, for the pur-
24 pose of enabling military commanders in Iraq, Afghani-
25 stan, and the Philippines to respond to urgent humani-

1 tarian relief and reconstruction requirements within their
2 areas of responsibility by carrying out programs that will
3 immediately assist the Iraqi, Afghan, and Filipino people.

4 (b) Not later than 15 days after the end of each fiscal
5 year quarter, the Secretary of Defense shall submit to the
6 congressional defense committees a report regarding the
7 source of funds and the allocation and use of funds during
8 that quarter that were made available pursuant to the au-
9 thority provided in this section or under any other provi-
10 sion of law for the purposes of the programs under sub-
11 section (a).

12 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

13 SEC. 9105. During fiscal year 2008, the Secretary
14 of Defense may transfer not to exceed \$6,500,000 of the
15 amounts in or credited to the Defense Cooperation Ac-
16 count, pursuant to 10 U.S.C. 2608, to such appropriations
17 or funds of the Department of Defense as the Secretary
18 shall determine for use consistent with the purposes for
19 which such funds were contributed and accepted: *Pro-*
20 *vided*, That such amounts shall be available for the same
21 time period as the appropriation to which transferred:
22 *Provided further*, That the Secretary shall report to the
23 Congress all transfers made pursuant to this authority.

24 SEC. 9106. Of the amount appropriated by this chap-
25 ter under the heading “Drug Interdiction and Counter-

1 Drug Activities, Defense,” not to exceed \$20,000,000 may
2 be used for the provision of support for counter-drug ac-
3 tivities of the Governments of Afghanistan, Kazakhstan,
4 Kyrgyzstan, Pakistan, Tajikistan, and Turkmenistan, as
5 specified in section 1033 of the National Defense Author-
6 ization Act for Fiscal Year 1998 (Public Law 105–85, as
7 amended by Public Laws 106–398, 108–136, 109–364,
8 and 110–181): *Provided*, That such support shall be in
9 addition to support provided under any other provision of
10 the law.

11 SEC. 9107. Amounts provided in this chapter for op-
12 erations in Iraq and Afghanistan may be used by the De-
13 partment of Defense for the purchase of up to 20 heavy
14 and light armored vehicles for force protection purposes,
15 notwithstanding price or other limitations specified else-
16 where in the Department of Defense Appropriations Act,
17 2008 (Public Law 110–116), or any other provision of
18 law: *Provided*, That notwithstanding any other provision
19 of law, funds provided in Public Law 110–116 and Public
20 Law 110–161 under the heading “Other Procurement,
21 Navy” may be used for the purchase of 21 vehicles re-
22 quired for physical security of personnel, notwithstanding
23 price limitations applicable to passenger vehicles but not
24 to exceed \$255,000 per vehicle: *Provided further*, That the
25 Secretary of Defense shall submit a report in writing no

1 later than 30 days after the end of each fiscal quarter
2 notifying the congressional defense committees of any pur-
3 chase described in this section, including cost, purposes,
4 and quantities of vehicles purchased.

5 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

6 SEC. 9108. Section 8122(c) of Public Law 110–116
7 is amended by adding at the end the following:

8 “(4) Upon a determination that all or part of the
9 funds transferred under paragraph (1) are not necessary
10 to accomplish the purposes specified in subsection (b),
11 such amounts may be transferred back to the ‘Mine Re-
12 sistant Ambush Protected Vehicle Fund’.”.

13 SEC. 9109. Notwithstanding any other provision of
14 law, not to exceed \$150,000,000 of funds made available
15 in this chapter may be obligated to conduct or support
16 a program to build the capacity of a foreign country’s na-
17 tional military forces in order for that country to conduct
18 counterterrorist operations or participate in or support
19 military and stability operations in which the U.S. Armed
20 Forces are a participant: *Provided*, That funds available
21 pursuant to the authority in this section shall be subject
22 to the same restrictions, limitations, and reporting re-
23 quirements as funds available pursuant to section 1206
24 of Public Law 109–163 as amended.

10 priate congressional committees: *Provided further*, That
11 the Secretary of Defense shall provide quarterly reports
12 to the congressional defense committees on the use of
13 funds provided in this paragraph.

2 tion, and funding: *Provided further*, That none of the as-
3 sistance provided under this heading in the form of funds
4 may be utilized for the provision of salaries, wages, or bo-
5 nuses to personnel of the Iraqi Security Forces: *Provided*
6 *further*, That the authority to provide assistance under
7 this heading is in addition to any other authority to pro-
8 vide assistance to foreign nations: *Provided further*, That
9 the Secretary of Defense may transfer such funds to ap-
10 propriations for military personnel; operation and mainte-

18 Secretary of State, shall set forth in a report to Congress
19 a comprehensive set of performance indicators and meas-
20 ures for progress toward military and political stability in
21 Iraq.

22 (b) The report shall include performance standards
23 and goals for security, economic, and security force train-
24 ing objectives in Iraq together with a notional timetable
25 for achieving these goals.

1 (c) In specific, the report requires, at a minimum,
2 the following:

3 (1) With respect to stability and security in
4 Iraq, the following:

5 (A) Key measures of political stability, in-
6 cluding the important political milestones that
7 must be achieved over the next several years.

8 (B) The primary indicators of a stable se-
9 curity environment in Iraq, such as number of
10 engagements per day, numbers of trained Iraqi
11 forces, trends relating to numbers and types of
12 ethnic and religious-based hostile encounters,
13 and progress made in the transition of responsi-
14 bility for the security of Iraqi provinces to the
15 Iraqi Security Forces under the Provincial Iraqi
16 Control (PIC) process.

17 (C) An assessment of the estimated
18 strength of the insurgency in Iraq and the ex-
19 tent to which it is composed of non-Iraqi fight-
20 ers.

21 (D) A description of all militias operating
22 in Iraq, including the number, size, equipment
23 strength, military effectiveness, sources of sup-
24 port, legal status, and efforts to disarm or re-
25 integrate each militia.

1 (E) Key indicators of economic activity
2 that should be considered the most important
3 for determining the prospects of stability in
4 Iraq, including—

5 (i) unemployment levels;

6 (ii) electricity, water, and oil produc-
7 tion rates; and

8 (iii) hunger and poverty levels.

9 (F) The most recent annual budget for the
10 Government of Iraq, including a description of
11 amounts budgeted for support of Iraqi security
12 and police forces and an assessment of how
13 planned funding will impact the training, equip-
14 ping and overall readiness of those forces.

15 (G) The criteria the Administration will
16 use to determine when it is safe to begin with-
17 drawing United States forces from Iraq.

18 (2) With respect to the training and perform-
19 ance of security forces in Iraq, the following:

20 (A) The training provided Iraqi military
21 and other Ministry of Defense forces and the
22 equipment used by such forces.

23 (B) Key criteria for assessing the capabili-
24 ties and readiness of the Iraqi military and
25 other Ministry of Defense forces, goals for

1 achieving certain capability and readiness levels
2 (as well as for recruiting, training, and equip-
3 ping these forces), and the milestones and no-
4 tional timetable for achieving these goals.

5 (C) The operational readiness status of the
6 Iraqi military forces, including the type, num-
7 ber, size, and organizational structure of Iraqi
8 battalions that are—

9 (i) capable of conducting
10 counterinsurgency operations independ-
11 ently without any support from Coalition
12 Forces;

13 (ii) capable of conducting
14 counterinsurgency operations with the sup-
15 port of United States or coalition forces; or

16 (iii) not ready to conduct
17 counterinsurgency operations.

18 (D) The amount and type of support pro-
19 vided by Coalition Forces to the Iraqi Security
20 Forces at each level of operational readiness.

21 (E) The number of Iraqi battalions in the
22 Iraqi Army currently conducting operations and
23 the type of operations being conducted.

1 (F) The rates of absenteeism in the Iraqi
2 military forces and the extent to which insur-
3 gents have infiltrated such forces.

4 (G) The training provided Iraqi police and
5 other Ministry of Interior forces and the equip-
6 ment used by such forces.

7 (H) The level and effectiveness of the Iraqi
8 Security Forces under the Ministry of Defense
9 in provinces where the United States has for-
10 mally transferred responsibility for the security
11 of the province to the Iraqi Security Forces
12 under the Provincial Iraqi Control (PIC) proc-
13 ess.

14 (I) Key criteria for assessing the capabili-
15 ties and readiness of the Iraqi police and other
16 Ministry of Interior forces, goals for achieving
17 certain capability and readiness levels (as well
18 as for recruiting, training, and equipping), and
19 the milestones and notional timetable for
20 achieving these goals, including—

21 (i) the number of police recruits that
22 have received classroom training and the
23 duration of such instruction;

1 (ii) the number of veteran police offi-
2 cers who have received classroom instruc-
3 tion and the duration of such instruction;

4 (iii) the number of police candidates
5 screened by the Iraqi Police Screening
6 Service, the number of candidates derived
7 from other entry procedures, and the suc-
8 cess rates of those groups of candidates;

9 (iv) the number of Iraqi police forces
10 who have received field training by inter-
11 national police trainers and the duration of
12 such instruction;

13 (v) attrition rates and measures of ab-
14 senteeism and infiltration by insurgents;
15 and

16 (vi) the level and effectiveness of the
17 Iraqi Police and other Ministry of Interior
18 Forces in provinces where the United
19 States has formally transferred responsi-
20 bility for the security of the province to the
21 Iraqi Security Forces under the Provincial
22 Iraqi Control (PIC) process.

23 (J) The estimated total number of Iraqi
24 battalions needed for the Iraqi security forces
25 to perform duties now being undertaken by coa-

1 lition forces, including defending the borders of
2 Iraq and providing adequate levels of law and
3 order throughout Iraq.

4 (K) The effectiveness of the Iraqi military
5 and police officer cadres and the chain of com-
6 mand.

7 (L) The number of United States and coa-
8 lition advisors needed to support the Iraqi secu-
9 rity forces and associated ministries.

10 (M) An assessment, in a classified annex if
11 necessary, of United States military require-
12 ments, including planned force rotations,
13 through the end of calendar year 2009.

14 SEC. 9205. (a) REPORT BY SECRETARY OF DE-
15 FENSE.—Not later than 30 days after the date of the en-
16 actment of this Act, the Secretary of Defense shall submit
17 to the congressional defense committees a report that con-
18 tains individual transition readiness assessments by unit
19 of Iraq and Afghan security forces. The Secretary of De-
20 fense shall submit to the congressional defense committees
21 updates of the report required by this subsection every 90

1 (c)(1) The Secretary of Defense shall transfer funds

8 SEC. 9304. (a) REPORT REQUIRED.—Not later than
9 120 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the

12 Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and the Director
13 of National Intelligence, shall jointly submit to Congress
14 a report setting forth the global strategy of the United

7 (A) does not undermine the military readi-
8 ness or homeland security of the United States;

9 (B) ensures adequate time between mili-
10 tary deployments for rest and training; and

11 (C) does not require further extensions of
12 military deployments to the extent practicable.

13 (c) CLASSIFIED ANNEX.—The report required by
14 subsection (a) shall be submitted in unclassified form, but
15 shall include a classified annex.

16 SEC. 9305. None of the funds provided in this title
17 may be used to finance programs or activities denied by
18 Congress in fiscal years 2007 or 2008 appropriations to
19 the Department of Defense or to initiate a procurement
20 or research, development, test and evaluation new start
21 program without prior written notification to the congres-

10 SEC. 9308. (a) Of the funds made available for “De-
11 fense Health Program” in Public Law 110–28,
12 \$75,000,000 is rescinded.

13 (b) Of the funds made available for “Joint Impro-
14 vised Explosive Device Defeat Fund” in Division L of the
15 Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2008 (Public Law 110–
16 161), \$71,531,000 is rescinded.

17 SEC. 9309. Of the funds appropriated in the U.S.
18 Troop Readiness, Veterans’ Care, Katrina Recovery, and
19 Iraq Accountability Appropriations Act, 2007 (Public Law
20 110–28) which remain available for obligation under the
21 “Iraq Freedom Fund”, \$150,000,000 is only for the Joint
22 Rapid Acquisition Cell, and \$10,000,000 is only for the
23 transportation of fallen service members.

24 SEC. 9310. Funds available in this title which are
