Dear Senator Lugar:

It was a pleasure to see you last week when I was in Washington. You were kind to take time from your busy schedule to visit with me and discuss Ball State University's needs for the coming year. Subsequent to our meeting, I met with Amy Oberhelman and Andrew Mills of your staff to discuss the following projects. I understand that Congress is struggling to restore public confidence in the appropriations process, particularly with regard to so-called "earmarks," and appreciate your leadership in that area. I want to assure you that Ball State University fully evaluates all proposed projects to ensure that they are in the public interest and worthy of your advocacy. As Congress begins work on the Fiscal Year 2009 appropriations process, I ask for your support for the following initiatives.

McKinley / Riverside Avenue Safety Improvement Project - \$5.8 million

Ball State University seeks federal assistance in the FY09 Transportation, Housing and Urban Development, and Related Agencies Appropriations Bill to complete construction of the third phase of the McKinley / Riverside Avenue Safety Improvement Project. Originally authorized by Congress in 1998, the project's goal is to eliminate the dangerous mix of vehicular and pedestrian traffic in the center of the Ball State campus. Phase I of the project was completed in 2005, and Phase II of the project was completed in 2006.

Bowen Center for Public Affairs - \$1.2 million

Ball State University seeks federal assistance in the FY09 Labor, Health & Human Services, Education and Related Agencies Appropriations Bill to support first year start up costs associated with the Bowen Center for Public Affairs. Named to honor former Indiana Governor, Otis R. Bowen, the Center will provide workshops on civic education, conduct research into best practices in government management, and offer training to local elected-officials with the goal of improving services to the public.

Nurse Training Program - \$1.7 million

Ball State University seeks federal assistance in the FY09 Labor, Health & Human Services, Education and Related Agencies Appropriations Bill to expand the capacity of Ball State's School of Nursing and help reduce the shortage of nurses in Indiana. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services estimates that Indiana will experience a shortage of 18,000 nurses by the year 2020. The project seeks to address this shortage by fielding a mobile classroom / simulation laboratory. The mobile unit will feature state-of-the-art "human patient simulators." These advanced, computer-controlled mannequins can simulate a wide variety of physiological and pharmacological conditions. In making such advanced training available in rural and underserved communities throughout Indiana, Ball State will help enable currently employed licensed practical nurses (LPNs) and certified nurse assistants (CNAs) to obtain baccalaureate degrees without leaving their full-time jobs.
