Dr. Katherine Bent of the Department of Veterans Affairs will be the new chief of the <u>Healthcare</u>, <u>Delivery and Methodologies</u> Integrated Review Group (IRG), the Center for Scientific Review announced today.

groups, assisted researchers at various stages of the funding process and conceptualized and arranged scientific meetings and professional symposia.

Dr. Bent has a doctorate from the University of Colorado Denver Graduate School. Among other degrees, she also is an advanced practice registered nurse, who graduated from the University of Virginia with specializations in complex illness and home and community health.

Her IRG reviews applications for research on health and health-related behaviors of individuals and populations, particularly studies related to socio-environmental factors, cultural factors and processes, and more. It is located in CSR's AIDS, Behavioral and Population Sciences Division.
