The DDM Seminar Series: "Management and Science: Partnering for Excellence" highlighted Dr. Robert Kriegel, author of the national bestseller *If It Ain't Broke...BREAK IT!*.

The next DDM Seminar will feature Jay Conger on February 8, 2007 in Masur Auditorium from 11am-noon. Currently, Mr. Conger is the Henry Kravis Research Professor of Leadership Studies at Claremont McKenna College. He is a former professor of organizational behavior at the London Business School and senior research scientist at the University of Southern California. Mr. Conger has written or co-written more than 90 articles and 11 books and has two new books in progress which focus on best practices in leadership and CEO leadership. His most recent book is *Growing Your Company's Leaders: How Great Organizations Use Succession Management to Sustain Competitive Advantage.* Other book topics include: leadership, management, change management, strategic communication and leadership development.
