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THE NEWEST MURAL PAINTED AT FBCC

The newest mural painted by Ryan Burr, art instructor, is located in the CLAN room in the second level of the student union building. The central historical figure is from a George Catlin painting of Old Bear. Old Bear is Mandan and a member of the Black Mouth Society and a medicine man. In the background is a white buffalo standing on a hilltop. Behind the white buffalo is a storm over the badlands. In this mural, Ryan created the effect of space and distance using the cloud formations and the receding buttes. The detail that was copied from the Catlin painting is intense. Ryan describes it as "complicated and impressionistic" especially since the figure is done larger than life.

FBCC ENTOURAGE TAKEN BY HAWAII



Five FBCC faculty members journeved to Honolulu, Hawaii along with several FBCC board members to attend the 38th Annual Convention of the National Indian Education Association (NIEA) held November 24-28, 2007. The faculty delegation, consisting of Delvin Driver, Susan Paulson, Wanbdi Perkins, Anna Rubia, and Alyce Spotted Bear, was selected from hundreds of applicants to present an educational forum entitled "Earth Lodge Values Model." The theme of the conference in the Hawaiian language was HO' I I KA PIKO ALOHA, meaning "Return to Cultural Honor and Sharing."

Having existed for nearly 40 years and with literally thousands of members , NIEA is the Grandmother of Indian Education. Her collective membership consists of students, parents, educators, and tribal leaders throughout Indian Country and beyond. Thus, the FBCC delegation was proud to be selected as presenters for the conference. However, it wasn't all smooth sailing in Honolulu for our faculty members.

Thursday evening, as Wanbdi Perkins was parked at the mall, thieves broke into Wanbdi's locked vehicle and stole his computer and other valuables. The computer contained the group's PowerPoint presentation, which they were scheduled to present the next day. The faculty members hurriedly met the next morning and re-planned their presentation.


According to individuals present for the well-attended forum, the presentation was informative and wonderful. Delvin Driver began with a prayer in Hidatsa.

He then told a traditional Hidatsa story. Susan Paulson then related the teachings in the story to the Earth Lodge Values Model. Wanbdi Perkins and Wayne Hunter introduced the Arikara section of the presentation with an Arikara prayer song, using hand drums to accompany their singing. Wanbdi and Susan both spoke about Arikara cultural values in relation to education at FBCC. Prior to Alyce Spotted Bear's talk about how technology is used in the FBCC classrooms, Wayne Hunter sang a Mandan song. Anna Rubia then spoke about the use of Constructivist methodology at FBCC.

The presentation concluded with Wayne explaining the handshake song before it was sung by Delvin, Wanbdi, and Wayne. The presentation was right on target with the convention's theme of infusing culture into educational practices.

The Earth Lodge Values Model is the philosophy of the Fort Berthold Community College based on the idea of the Earth lodge as a home for the Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara people. Home is the place where you establish your identity and values. The Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara have been together for many years and share common values which are incorporated into the model. This model is used as an assessment tool for students to evaluate what they have learned from their experience at Fort Berthold Community College.

The central values of **Spiritual**ity, **People**, **Culture**, and **Future** are depicted in the diagram as the center poles of the earth lodge which support the lodge and from which all the other values lean on for support. The melding of the strengths of the people, the spirituality and culture and how to infuse these values with modern technology and methods into the future form the basis of all FBCC activity.



PERSONALIZED HAND-PRINT PUMPKIN PIE RECIPE



RECIPE INGREDIENTS:

1 15-oz. pkg. refrigerated piecrust

1 16-oz. can packed pumpkin

1 14-oz. can sweetened condensed milk

2 eggs

1 tsp. apple pie spice

1 cup semisweet chocolate chips (optional) 1. Heat the oven to 375 degrees, then begin making the turkey handprint for the pie. Trace your child's handprint on a piece of lightweight cardboard, then cut it out to create a stencil. Place the stencil over one of the circles of pie dough and cut around it, adding turkey feet to the bottom of the hand.

2. Place the cutout on a nonstick baking sheet. Brush with water and sprinkle lightly with sugar. Bake for 8 to 12 minutes or until golden brown. Let cool.

3. Next, place the remaining circle of pie dough in a 9-inch glass pie pan. Press the crust firmly against the sides and bottom of the pan. Crimp the edges. 4. In a large mixing bowl, combine the pumpkin, sweetened condensed milk, eggs and apple pie spice. Mix until smooth. Stir in the chocolate chips, if desired.

5. Pour the mixture into the piecrust and bake at 375 degrees for 35 to 40 minutes or until an inserted knife comes out clean (except for melted chocolate).

6. Place the baked turkey cutout in the center of the pie and allow the pie to cool before serving. Makes one 9-inch pie.



THANKSGIVING RECIPIES FROM FBCC

Individual Cheesecakes

3 8-ounce cream cheese packages

2/3 cup sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 can cherry/blueberry pie filling

3 eggs

24 vanilla wafer cookies

24 cupcake liners

whipped cream

Beat cheese and sugar well, about 3 minutes.

Add vanilla, eggs, and beat until blended.

Place liners in pans and cookies flat

side down in liners.

Fill each cupcake liner 🗄 full.

Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Don't over bake!

Cool on rack.

Spoon pie filling over top. Refrigerate.

Top with Whipped cream.

Hot Artichoke- Crab Dip

1/2 cup crab cake mixture, reserved from Crab Cakes OR see recipe below
1 (14-ounce) can artichoke hearts, drained and chopped
1 (10-ounce) package frozen chopped spinach, thawed and well drained
1 cup low fat sour cream 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley leaves

1 teaspoon salt-free garlic and herb seasoning

1/2 cup grated Parmesan , divided 2 pita pockets, cut into wedges Assorted vegetables (baby carrots, sliced zucchini, celery stalks)

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F.

In a medium bowl, combine crab cake mixture, artichoke hearts, spinach, sour cream, parsley, seasoning, and 1/4 cup of the Parmesan. Mix well.

Transfer mixture to a shallow baking dish and top with remaining parmesan cheese.

Bake 10 to 12 minutes, until dip is hot and cheese is golden.

Serve dip with pita wedges and vegetables on the side (or crackers!).


I encourage all students to participate in the various clubs and student organizations. Every year we send students to Washington D.C. in February, to lobby congress for increased tribal college funding. Not just for our college but for the other 34 tribal colleges nation-wide. We will also have students travel to the AIHEC, AIBL, and AISES conferences. The AI-HEC Conference will be held in Bismarck, March 17-20 2008. Fort Berthold Community College is one of the host institutions.

At this time let me update you on some of the upcoming events this year. Bids will be submitted soon and construction will begin this spring on the new 1.1 million dollar Early Childhood Leaning Center to be located on the north side of our current facilities. Funds were allocated through the Title III program. This will provide a new daycare service for our students. 2008 marks the 35th anniversary of Fort Berthold Community College. FBCC was established in May 2, 1973. We will be offering free tuition to all eligible students beginning the Spring of 2008. We are also looking at waiving all past bills of former students for years prior to 2005. Please get the word out to your friends and relatives about this new opportunity. You can also contact the Student Services department for more information. I will give more updates about upcoming events and opportunities in the next newsletter.

Cultural Seed Bank

The Fort Berthold Community College Agriculture Department has purchased a specialized cabinet for storing cultural garden seeds. It has been our goal to start this cultural seed bank. If any families of the Fort Berthold Reservation have any traditional garden seeds they want to preserve, all they have to do is bring in a small amount of the seeds to the college with their name on the container and what type of seed it is and the Ag Department will store it for free of charge. In the future if the family seed is lost, such as a fire, etc., the family could come to the FBCC Traditional Seed Band and collect their family seeds. June Berry Research

The Fort Berthold Community College Ag Department and NDSU have been involved in a June berry Research two types of June berry plants called Smokey's and Martens were planted during the first year in various types of environments such as LOROX, Hay, Straw, Rye, Clean Cultivation, Land Fabrication and Surflan. In 2007 the June berry Research is in its 3rd year of providing information consisting of counting and pulling weeds and broadleaf plants, soil temperature testing, measurement and soil samples. The information obtained will be sent to NDSU to compile information for the June berry Research grant. After the June Berry Research Program the June berry plants will continue to be part of the FBCC Land Lab to produce June berries for years to come for the enrolled members of the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation.
