So why the attempt to hang onto this method, to set starting doses, when clearly this entire method of testing is outdated, dangerous to the public health, and is highly objectionable to many taxpayers, who know enough about what is going on behind closed doors, to voice an objection.

Please take this step, but please do not forget how important it is to move forward into the this new century, with the promise of a better, safer method for testing, but also one that takes into consideration the sanctity of all life, and preserving not wasting the lives of those animals, who aren't given the option of whether they wish to participate in these deadly studies.
