DRUG ABUSE INFORMATION MATERIAL MORATORIUM

ANNOUNCEMENT

- 1. During the past several years an enormous volume and variety of educational materials on drug abuse have been produced by public agencies and private organizations, directed through many media to many different audiences. The pace of production has been so rapid that there has been little opportunity to evaluate the quality or the effectiveness of this effort. Such an evaluation is essential and overdue.
- 2. The Special Action Office for Drug Abuse Prevention, The White House, has requested that production of all Federally-funded drug abuse prevention materials e curtailed for a period of six months. During that time, The White House Special ction Office will conduct an inventory and review of all existing materials and establish guidelines for development of new material.
- 3. The six-month curtailment covers all drug abuse prevention materials produced directly or indirectly with Federal support. Drug abuse prevention materials are defined as printed messages in all formats—films, recordings, video tapes, etc.,—in which a significant portion of the content is concerned with providing facts about drugs, their effects on the general populace or major population groups, and/or designed to affect attitudes or behavior.
- 4. In the event there is a need to reissue or update materials used as part of ongoing grant— or contract—supported programs, request for exception should be submitted in writing to the appropriate NIH awarding unit. The request for exception should give a justification for production of the materials during the curtailment period, general purpose, audience to be covered by distribution, numbers of copies required, and budget for the production. The request should be accompanied by two samples of the material to be produced.

The GUIDE is published at irregular intervals to provide policy, program, and administrative information to individuals and organizations who need to be kept informed of requirements and changes in grants and contracts programs administered y the National Institutes of Health.

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
