# The National Inventory of Family Planning Services: 1975 Survey Results

Statistics from the 1975 survey of the National Inventory of Family Planning Services are presented on demographic and institutional characteristics of service sites that provide medical and nonmedical family planning services. Data are given on the physical location of the service sites, their primary purpose and operating responsibility, the number of patients served, medical and ancillary services provided, and the contraceptive methods available.

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# THE NATIONAL INVENTORY OF FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES: 1975 SURVEY RESULTS

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# INTRODUCTION

This report presents findings from the 1975 survey of the National Inventory of Family Planning Services. The National Inventory is a comprehensive listing of family planning service sites in the United States and selected territories excluding private physicians' offices. These service sites may provide direct medical family planning services, or they may serve as referral or contributor agencies, thus being classified as providers of nonmedical family planning services.

The data presented in this report for the National Inventory of Family Planning Services will differ from those data obtained through the National Reporting System for Family Planning Services for the following reasons. The National Inventory is designed to collect information on the characteristics of the service sites themselves on a periodic basis; the National Reporting System obtains data on each patient receiving services at the time the services are provided. Additionally, the scope of coverage or the universes of these two data collection programs are not the same. The National Inventory attempts to include all sites providing family planning services, whether federally funded or not and whether provided to the public at large or to a special segment of the population such as college students or military personnel. The National Reporting System, however, is composed primarily of federally funded service sites and does not necessarily include all independent sites or those providing services to these special populations. Because of these differences in their universes and methods of data collection, there will be variations in the data reported by the two programs.

The 1975 survey of the National Inventory of Family Planning Services is the second of the periodic surveys to be conducted among providers of family planning services. The first survey was conducted in 1974. These surveys have been designed to gather basic, general-purpose characteristics about providers of family planning services, such as number and distribution of service sites, physical location, operating responsibility, number of patients served, and services provided.

A total of 11,340 sites were surveyed in 1975. Of these, 5,898 were presumed to be medical providers, 4,036 nonmedical providers, and 1,406 were previously nonproviders of services whose current status was unknown. Completion of the survey yielded some changes in the mailing universe of the National Inventory. A total of 1,386 sites were deleted from the universe because they were either out of business, out of scope, duplicates, or postmaster returns. There were also changes in provider status-224 nonprovider sites reported that family planning services were now being provided, 156 medical sites reported a change to nonmedical status, and 201 sites changed from nonmedical to medical. The result of these deletions and additions was a revised provider universe of 8,828 service sites-5,636 medical providers and

3,192 nonmedical providers. A total of 7,234 service sites provided data for the 1975 survey for an overall response rate of 82 percent. These 7,234 responding sites included 4,660 medical providers and 2,574 nonmedical providers.

In presenting the data collected in the 1975 survey, only data from the 7,234 responding service sites were utilized. No effort was made to inflate these data to compensate for those service sites that did not respond to the survey. Therefore, all tabulations and figures presented are based solely on the data reported by the responding service sites.

# MEDICAL FAMILY PLANNING SERVICE SITES

The medical family planning service site was the main object of interest of the survey. Medical service sites were requested to complete questions about a variety of characteristics including physical location, operating responsibility, primary purpose, number of patients served, number of visits, medical and ancillary services provided, contraceptive methods offered, and staffing.

# **Geographic Distribution**

Table 1 shows the distribution of the responding 4,660 medical service sites by State and territory. In the previous (1974) survey, a total of 4,607 sites had responded as providing medical services, with 4,494 of these constituting the data base for tabulations from that earlier survey. The percent increase in the number of responding sites from 4,494 in 1974 to the 4,660 in 1975 is nearly 4 percent. Sixteen States and one territory in the 1975 survey had reductions in the number of sites responding, despite the overall national increase in total number of responding sites. The 16 States were Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Michigan, New Mexico, Ohio, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Utah, Virginia, and West Virginia plus Puerto Rico. For 15 of these States and Puerto Rico, the average decrease was 6 sites. For Tennessee, however, the decrease in the number of responding sites was 132. (Rather than an indication of an actual reduction in the number of sites, this decrease, in all probability, resulted from problems encountered in collecting data from that State. See appendix I.)

The geographic and regional distributions of the medical and nonmedical service sites are illustrated in table 2. As in the 1974 survey, the South again had a ratio of medical service sites of more than 2 to 1 when compared with the West and a ratio of nearly 3 to 1 when compared with the Northeast and North Central Regions. The North Central Region was also the only one of the four geographic regions that had more nonmedical than medical service sites. This occurred in only one of the four geographic areas; however, when the medical sites were grouped according to Federal regions, three showed this tendency—Region V, Region VII, and Region VIII. (See appendix II.)

# **Physical Location**

As defined for this survey, the location of the service site is any location where family planning services are provided on a regularly scheduled basis. Responses to this item of the questionnaire are presented in table 3. These data and their comparison to 1974 National Inventory data are summarized in table A.

A large majority of the medical sites were located in health department buildings. As might

be expected, approximately 90 percent of the medical service sites located in health department buildings were operated by State or local government agencies. Comparison of location responses between 1974 and 1975 shows few major changes in location of the sites. The main changes were a 5-percent decrease of sites in health department buildings and an almost 6-percent increase in the "other" location category.

# **Operating Responsibility**

In table 4, the responding medical service sites are distributed by State according to their operating responsibility. Table B shows the comparison between 1974 and 1975 data as far as operating responsibility is concerned. As can be seen by this summary distribution, the largest proportion of these sites was operated by government agencies, primarily State and county governments. Corporations also operated a large percent of the sites—nearly one-fourth.

The majority of these corporations were nonprofit operations and appeared to be primarily affiliates of Planned Parenthood. Though

not stated specifically in these tables, profitmaking organizations accounted for only about 1 percent of the total responding service sites.

No large variations occurred in operating responsibility between 1974 and 1975. Although the family planning field is subject to much change, with frequent opening and closing of individual sites, this observation suggests that the basic nature of the sites does not change significantly.

# **Primary Purpose**

As would be expected, the majority of the service sites reported medical family planning as their primary purpose (table 5). These data have been summarized and compared with 1974 data in table C.

The tendency to have medical family planning as the primary purpose spanned all levels of operating responsibility. Only those agencies or organizations whose prime health function is the provision of comprehensive health care, such as the Indian Health Service and universities, reported a lower number of sites with medical family planning as the primary purpose. When compared with 1974 figures, there were again only slight changes. The greatest change was the increase in the "other" category (primarily in general gynecologic services), from 3 percent of the respondents in 1974 to 6 percent of the respondents in 1975.

# Patients and Visits

Tables 6 and 7 show the number of patients, new patients, and visits as reported by the responding service sites in each State, territory, and geographic area. While other items of the questionnaire requested information current as of the response date, these items requested annual figures for calendar year 1974. Of the responding sites, 41 did not begin operation until 1975 and had no data for 1974. For this reason, the number of sites represented in these tables is less than the total number of responding sites given elsewhere in this report.

Table D shows the percent distribution of service sites by Federal region along with the corresponding distribution of patients served and visits reported. The table aptly illustrates that the percents of patients served and visits reported for each region compare closely with the percent of service sites located in each region. This would tend to indicate that when the average patient load per clinic within each region is considered, there are no great variations among the region averages or between each region's average and the national average.

A total of 5.1 million patients were reported served by these 4,619 service sites; these patients paid 8.3 million visits. This represents an average of 1.6 visits for each patient. Table E shows an increase of approximately 16 percent in both the total number of patients served and the total

number of visits reported in 1975 as compared with those in 1974. This increase is approximately 5 times the increase in the number of responding sites, 4,619 in 1975 and 4,494 in 1974. This ratio would seem to be too high for the patient and visit increases to be accounted

for strictly by the increase in number of sites responding. It would appear, therefore, that increased patient loads of most sites contributed greatly to the increase in reported patients and visits. This assumption is verified to some extent by the large increase in new patients reported (nearly 24 percent).

# **Medical Services Provided**

Medical services provided by the responding service sites are described in tables 8 and 9. Table F lists the 19 categories of medical services ranked according to the percent of clinics providing each service in the 1975 survey. The services are separated into those commonly provided by most clinics and those less commonly provided. Corresponding percents from the 1974 survey are also presented.

As illustrated by table F, the categories of medical services revealed a wide range of provision—from 99 percent for contraceptive prescription and taking of blood pressure to 18 percent for male sterilization.




Figure 1. Comparison of percents of responding medical family planning service sites providing each type of medical service: United States and territories, 1974 and 1975

A clear division in the type of services provided can also be seen in table F. Those

medical services that could be considered as standard services were provided by more than 80 percent of the sites. More specialized or unusual services were primarily offered by half or even fewer of the sites. Figure 1 represents the comparison of services provided in 1974 and 1975.

# **Ancillary Services Available**

Ancillary services as defined by the survey are primarily those social and/or educational services that provide support for the medical services program of the service site. Of the 4,660 medical sites responding to the survey, 11 reported that they provided no ancillary services. Tables 8 and 9 show the relationship between provision of ancillary services and location and operating responsibility. A comparison of the percent of sites providing each service in 1975 and 1974 is shown in table G.

Two of the categories included in the 1975 survey are not part of the 1974 survey. Both of these (contracting or paying others and providing space and so forth) had relatively low percents of provision in 1975. The bar graph in




Figure 2. Comparison of percents of responding medical family planning service sites providing each type of ancillary service: United States and territories, 1974 and 1975

figure 2 illustrates the comparison of percents depicted in the previous table.

# **Contraceptive Methods Provided**

Findings concerning the number of clinics that provided each of the various contraceptive

methods are presented in tables 8 and 9. A comparison of the 11 methods used by the clinics is shown in table H for 1974 and 1975.

Comparisons between 1974 and 1975 show substantial decreases in the number of sites providing sterilization and increases in the number of sites offering condoms and diaphragms. A major increase can also be seen in the number of sites offering natural family planning, with the




Figure 3. Comparison of percents of responding medical family planning service sites offering each type of contraceptive method:

percent of sites more than doubling in a year's time.

Although most sites usually offered the more effective means of nonpermanent contraception, in recent years there has been increased consumer concern about the physical side effects of both oral contraceptives and IUD's. These concerns were reflected in the increase in offerings of methods without these adverse side effects.

The substantial changes in the percent of service sites offering each of the contraceptive methods can be easily seen when a bar chart is developed as in figure 3.

# Staffing

Of the 4,660 responding medical family planning service sites, 4,302 answered the question about the staff employed at the sites. A total of 43,674 paid and volunteer workers were reported. Table J categorizes these workers.

# NONMEDICAL FAMILY PLANNING SERVICE SITES

Less information was requested from the nonmedical family planning service site than from the medical sites. Information was sought on such items as physical location, operating responsibility, and the types of nonmedical services the site provided.

# Geographic Distribution

Tables 1 and 2 show the distribution of nonmedical service sites by State, territory, geographic area, and Federal region. As indicated in the section on distribution of medical sites, the North Central Region contained more nonmedical sites than medical sites, the only geographic region in which this occurred.

# Physical Location and Operating Responsibility

Tables 10 and 11 present data about the location and operating responsibility of the nonmedical sites. Nearly half of the nonmedical sites were operated by State governments and

more than 85 percent were operated by either the State or county government. A majority (62 percent) of the nonmedical sites were located in State or local welfare department buildings.

# Services Provided

The most frequently provided service as illustrated in tables 12 and 13 was referral to

another site for medical family planning services. About 97 percent of all responding nonmedical sites performed this service. To a lesser degree, contracting with or paying others to provide family planning services (about 36 percent) and providing space, equipment, and so forth to others who performed family planning services (about 8 percent) were also services performed at nonmedical sites.

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# APPENDIX I

# METHODOLOGY

The 1975 survey of the National Inventory of Family Planning Services is the second survey of family planning service providers to be conducted as part of this program. The survey is designed to acquire information on the facilities that provide family planning services in the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa, Guam, and the Canal Zone.

The data collection effort began in late June 1975 and consisted of a mail survey to a total of 11,340 known and potential providers of family planning services. These 11,340 facilities were divided into three groups—5,898 medical service providers, 4,036 nonmedical service providers, and 1,406 potential providers (nonproviders) whose status was unknown.

An initial mailing and two followup mailings were conducted on the universe. For the mailing phase of the data collection, each State was queried as to whether the questionnaires for that State should be mailed through a State agency. Fifteen of the States requested that this be done. The remaining States were surveyed by mailing questionnaires directly to the field. Of the 15 States requiring special handling, a unique situation arose with the State of Tennessee. Although this State previously indicated that the questionnaires would be completed by the State agency or forwarded to the service sites for completion, the State ultimately refused to do so. This created a large void in the responses from Tennessee as can be seen in the tables containing individual State data. Data reported for the State of Tennessee are the result of telephone and personal followup.

Telephone followup after the three mailings were completed was conducted with some of the nonresponding facilities. In addition, personal contact by U.S. Bureau of the Census interviewers was conducted with a sample of nonresponding facilities. The actual data collection phase of the survey was completed in October 1975.

Responses to the survey resulted in 1,386 deletions from the original universe as being out of business, out of scope, duplicates, and postmaster returns. Additionally, changes in provider status occurred as follows:

201 nonmedical sites changed to medical sites.

156 medical sites changed to nonmedical sites.

127 nonprovider sites changed to medical sites.

97 nonprovider sites changed to nonmedical sites.

The combined effect of these deletions and changes in status produced a revised provider universe of 8,828 service sites—5,636 medical service providers and 3,192 nonmedical service providers.

Of the 5,636 medical service providers, 4,660 sites (83 percent) responded to the survey and provided data. Of the 3,192 nonmedical service providers, 2,574 (81 percent) responded to the survey. Medical service providers were asked to complete all 18 items on the questionnaire, while nonmedical service providers were asked to answer only items 1-10.

The total of 7,234 sites responding to the survey represent an overall response rate of 82 percent of the revised universe of 8,828 sites. The 7,234 responding sites form the data base

for this report. No attempt has been made to inflate the figures statistically in order to compensate for the total nonresponse by a site and thus agree with the universe of 8,828 sites.

Although no inflation of the data to represent the total universe was performed, a statistical adjustment or imputation was made for nonresponse to specific items on the questionnaire. Those items that were imputed if blank were:

Physical location.

Operating responsibility.

Primary purpose.

Total patients served, new patients, total visits.

Medical services provided.

Ancillary services provided.

Contraceptive methods provided.

For any questionnaire that contained a blank in one or more of the above items, the data file from the previous survey of that service site was accessed. The required data were then extracted and entered into the blank items.

For a small number of sites, data from the previous survey were not available. In those instances, data were entered into the blank items according to the following procedures:

Physical location—telephone contact with the service site.

Total patients served, new patients, total visits—if at least one of these three items was present, the missing item(s) was obtained by using ratios based on the national figures from the previous survey. To obtain approximations when all three items were blank, the average figure for each item was determined by State from the previous survey. These figures were then entered into the blank items on the basis of the State of location of that service site.

Medical services provided.

Ancillary services provided.

Contraceptive methods provided.

For each category within the latter three items, the average number of service sites providing that service or method was determined from the previous survey. Any service or method provided by more than 75 percent of the service sites was used as an approximation.

### APPENDIX II

# **DEFINITIONS AND GEOGRAPHIC AREAS**

# **Family Planning Definitions**

Some of these definitions appear on the survey form.

Family planning services.—Family planning services provide the means that enable individuals to meet their family planning objectives. These services are medical, social, and educational.

Medical family planning services refer to any of the following services provided by a physician, nurse-midwife, registered nurse, or other authorized personnel: medical history; physical examination; laboratory testing; testing, consultation, and treatment including continuing medical supervision; issuance of drugs and contraceptive supplies; and appropriate medical referral when indicated.

Nonmedical family planning services are those social and educational services such as provision of information and counseling about family planning; followup program; contraceptive education; outreach; or the provision of transportation and babysitting, both of which are provided to enable a person to attend a family planning clinic or to otherwise obtain medical family planning services.

Service site.—A clinic or service site is a place or facility at which any family planning services are provided on a regularly scheduled basis. It may be a hospital, health center, mobile unit, freestanding site, church, or storefront. For mobile units each stop is considered a clinic location; therefore, a separate questionnaire should be completed for each stop or location. Physicians' offices should be considered as clinic

locations only when there is a formal relationship with some project or agency which is responsible for providing family planning services. Physicians, nurses, volunteers, etc., who make home visits for the purpose of delivering a family planning service should count their home base of operations as the clinic location.

Family planning patient.—A family planning patient is a client who meets one of the following conditions during her/his visit:

- (1) The client receives a contraceptive method or continues a method of contraception.
- (2) The client receives counseling regarding sterilization, infertility, or contraception in conjunction with related medical services. (Pregnancy testing or venereal disease testing alone is not accepted as a medical service.)

# Composition of "Other" Categories

Terms relating to "other" categories include: Other physical location.—State, county, or local welfare department or government building including courthouse, city hall; military base or dispensary; freestanding clinic; dwelling including house, apartment housing project, semiattached house; office building including bank building, rented office; privately owned, leased, or rented building; miscellaneous sites including visiting nurse association, adoption agency, Indian health office, medical center, maternity home, remodeled furniture store, bus station, health maintenance organization, YWCA, youth crisis center, rehabilitation center, model family practice unit, model cities facility, and Salvation Army home for girls.

Operating responsibility—other Federal Government.—Department of Defense (Army, Navy, Air Force, etc.), Veterans Administration, Public Health Service (not Indian Health Service), Urban League, National Institute of Mental Health, Agricultural Works Health Project, and Family Planning Council.

Operating responsibility—other non-Federal Government.—County hospital board.

Operating responsibility—other nongovernment.—Private mental health agency, nonprofit educational corporation, and students.

Other primary service or purpose.—General gynecologic services, abortion, thermorhythm clinic, mental retardation care, and child comprehensive health.

Other medical services provided.—Nutritional counseling; abortions; genetic counseling; sterilization counseling; prenatal care; treatment of vaginal infection; diagnosis and treatment of low

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hematocrit; physical examination; purified protein derivative testing; rubella treatment; immunizations; chest X-ray; Mantoux test; nonroutine laboratory tests; weight or diet counseling; tuberculosis screening; cautery; treatment of infections; white blood cell count; hypertension and diabetes screening; mental health care; radiological, heart and lung examination; endometrial biopsy; menstrual induction; colposcopy; electrocardiogram; treatment of cervicitis; and rubella testing.

Other ancillary services.—Dental care or referral, education on breast and cervical cancer, prenatal classes, "rap" sessions, films and visual aids, translation for Spanish- and Italian-speaking patients, recreation and social services programs, consumers' advisory board, and training of medical students.

Other contraceptive methods.—Withdrawal, suppositories.


