

Congressional Leadership

When Democrats gained control of the United States Senate and House of Representatives following the 2006 elections, the threshold of hope for building a stronger and healthier America was expanded. Charged with helping navigate the new direction for America were key Members of the CBC, including: Congressman James E. Clyburn (SC), Congressman John Conyers (MI), Congressman Charles B. Rangel (NY) & Congressman Bennie G. Thompson (MS). Congresswoman Juanita Millender-McDonald (CA) & Congresswoman Stephanie Tubbs Jones (OH) also served as Committee Chairs before their passing. Millender-McDonald as Chair of the Committee on House Administration and Tubbs Jones as Chair of the Committee on Standards of Official Conduct. An additional 17 CBC Members earned positions as subcommittee chairs with jurisdiction over issues ranging from the federal budget, crime to housing and the environment.



Changing Course: Legislative Highlights of the 110th Congress

CBC Taskforces worked diligently on legislation that will shape the future of our nation. Here is a snapshot of our efforts:

Gulf Coast Recovery

CBC Members have worked on several pieces of legislation and secured billions of dollars for the impacted region. The following legislation was passed during the 110th Congress: Small Disadvantaged Business Disaster Eligibility Act; Hurricanes Katrina and Rita Federal Match Relief Act of 2007; Gulf Coast Hurricane Housing Recovery Act of 2007; Federal Housing Finance Reform; RECOVER Act of 2007 (Relief for Entrepreneurs Coordination of Objectives and Values for Effective Recovery); and the Disaster Surety Bond Enhancement Act.

Education

The College Opportunity and Affordability Act (the Higher Education Act Reauthorization) was one of the most significant education reauthorizations during the 110th Congress. The legislation increased the Pell Grant, simplifying the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), improved HBCU funding (including Gulf Coast recovery efforts) and implemented a study to determine whether standardized admissions tests are inherently racially biased.

Nutrition and Agriculture

The Farm, Nutrition and Bioenergy Act of 2007 included an increase for federal funding for 1890 land grant institutions and provides new language to address outstanding claims resulting in Pigford v. Veneman for socially disadvantaged

Black farmers and ranchers. The CBC helped to increase the minimum benefit for the Food Stamp program and boosted the budget for nutrition programs by 46% over the 2002 Farm Bill reauthorization, with additional aid for Haiti.

Re-entry and Restoration

The Second Chance Act, classified as a revolutionary piece of legislation, was spearheaded by CBC Members to address the needs of the 1,700 individuals released from state and federal prison each day throughout the nation. It authorizes federal grants to government agencies, community and faith based organizations to provide employment assistance, subsidize abuse assistance, housing, family assistance, mentoring and victim support.

Children's Health Insurance

The State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) included provisions that would cover the maximum number of eligible uninsured children with comprehensive and culturally appropriate health care services and treatments.

HBCU Support

The Minority Serving Institution Digital and Wireless Technology Opportunity Act of 2007 establishes new grant programs with the Department of Commerce to provide \$250 million in 2008 for Minority Serving Institutions, including Historically Black Colleges and Universities. The law was constructed to address the technological infrastructure gap that currently exists.

Worker Rights

The federal minimum wage will be increased to \$7.25 an hour over the next two years. Nearly 13 million Americans will benefit.


