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Executive summary

Overall 13 outreach activities, involving 192 participants, were conducted this quarter. We again saw a slight increase in Network membership in the region. A third "Geeks" new technologies workshop was offered at the Western Medical Library Association (MLA) Chapters 2006 Annual Meeting and more have been requested. The second statewide Go Local service in the region was launched in Nevada in September (see attached article).

RAC member Peggy Tahir, from UCSF, attended the 2006 Asian American & Pacific Islander Health Summit, sponsored by the Asian & Pacific Islander American Health Forum, September 14-16, 2006, in San Jose, CA. She networked with conference delegates and distributed informational brochures promoting NN/LM membership. After the conference, the Senior Health Educator from Chinese Hospital in San Francisco contacted us with an interest in joining the NN/LM and applying for outreach funding to expand their bi-lingual community library and develop additional resource materials.

The annual Resource Libraries Directors meeting was held on September 15, 2006 at the UC San Diego Biomedical Library in La Jolla, CA. It was preceded by the UCSD Biomedical Library Grand Opening on September 14, followed by dinner at Director Susan Starr's home that evening (see attached documents related to the meeting).

Librarians from four NN/LM PSR projects were featured on NLM's National Medical Librarians Month, October 2006 page.

We successfully got on the programs for several national 2007 exhibits. At the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons meeting in February, 2007, we are presenting a one-hour PubMed workshop. At the American Academy of Allergy, Asthma, & Immunology annual meeting, also in February 2007, we will present a poster session entitled "Locating Evidence-based Literature in Immunology Using PubMed/MEDLINE." At the National Student Nurses' Association annual meeting in April, 2007, we will present several PubMed workshops to groups of student nurses and nursing school faculty members.

Kelli Ham established a goal in August 2006 to develop a plan for creating podcasts for consumer health and training topics. Her interest in podcasting became evident over the summer, after she attended a UCLA Library Information Literacy Program (ILP) presentation, "Multimedia library Instruction for Multi-literate Net-Gens: Infomercials and Podcasts." Her interest and research into what would be the optimal environment for producing podcasts led to the formation of an ad hoc podcasting planning group within the UCLA Library. In the fall of 2006, Kelli participated in a NN/LM teleconference and heard about NLM's efforts and accomplishments with podcasting. Following the teleconference, NLM consulted with Kelli about her growing knowledge and experience with podcasting and learned of her plans with this initiative.

Outreach

• Go Local Initiatives—Jeanette Ryan, Jim Curtis, others

Go Local initiatives were successfully launched in AZ and NV. Jeanette was involved with two Go Local projects—the State of Arizona and Tribal Connections Four Corners. Both initiatives were headed by Paul Bracke, but they were handled slightly differently since four states were involved with Tribal Connections Four Corners. Students with the Knowledge River program of the University of Arizona School of Information Resources and Library Science worked on Go Local for Arizona. Each student worked on various rural counties. They got some data from the Arizona Department of Health Services, and added additional resources as they encountered them. The Arizona State Library received a LSTA grant which could be used to improve access to health information for consumers, by developing a statewide partnership to maintain Go Local data. Large organizations, e.g., hospitals, should be able to keep their data up-to-date. The middle tier of organizations may need training to maintain their Go Local data. CABL and SABL are potential partners in this effort. Smaller organizations may not have the resources to maintain Go Local data, so Arizona Health Sciences Library will explore ways to help them. Difficulties to address with large metropolitan areas such as Phoenix and Tucson are knowing when the listings are complete and keeping the data updated over the long term.

NevadaHealthNet.org had a "quiet" launch on 8/14/06, and was formally presented to the Nevada Library Association on 8/15/06. It has a concentration of resources in Clark and Washoe counties, which have about 80% of the state's population, and may evolve into more than just Go Local data. The greatest challenge was identifying resources in Las Vegas. The bulk of the work was done by the project staff, consisting of a project director and two students. They found data by prowling the Internet and adding resources as they discovered them. They also used phone book yellow pages to identify resources. The database currently has about 2,000 records. Thirteen of Nevada's 17 counties are classified as "frontier" and some rural counties do not have web site information. The official public rollout of NevadaHealthNet.org is next week. It will be advertised with press releases and on 105 TV stations. Sustainability of the database may be problematic, since funding was provided only for start-up expenses. Public librarians may prove helpful in maintaining the system.

Jeanette noted that 211 services related to emergency preparedness are receiving state funds and may be creating a similar directory to Go Local. AHSL doesn't want to re-create the wheel, but the quality of 211 services varies from state to state, or even among counties. But 211 funding could be a resource in sustainability. A question for NLM is: How much is Go Local being used? Arizona placed public service announcements on NPR in Maricopa and Pima counties to see if there was an impact on usage. Tribal Connections Four Corners Go Local has also been advertised. The AZHealthInfo web site utilizes very different vocabulary than Go Local does, and that issue needs to be resolved before the two sites can be tied together. Currently they cut and paste resources from AZ Go Local to Four Corners Go Local. NLM is looking at ways to import data from one system to the other.

Judy mentioned that foundations may be interested in providing funding to support Go Local. Go Local development generally takes several years to develop. It may be just as easy to search Google than to use Go Local. But one advantage is having Go Local data integrated with MedlinePlus in one package. In California, the top ten counties in population are being examined for possible Go Local projects. PREL is interested in working on a Pacific Basin demonstration project, perhaps with just one island.

Some locations may find Go Local data useful and others may not. If NLM allowed institutional branding of Go Local web sites, that would be a benefit. It's important to weigh the benefits vs. the costs. Go Local would be useful in public libraries, because so many patrons ask health-related questions. Perhaps Go Local needs more marketing. Another strategy might be to work with licensing agencies as a source of notification for new resources, rather than trying to keep up with them all. It's more effective to use multiple ways to maintain the data.

• Native American Initiatives – Jeanette Ryan, Kay Deeney – see powerpoints

Jeanette mentioned the daunting travel distances involved with Native American outreach, and that it does include urban populations. There is one Resource Library in Arizona, AHSL, which has an institutional outreach mandate. AHSL maintains visibility in a number of ways, and has a number of partners, including: Inter-Tribal Council of Arizona, Colorado River Indian

Tribes, Tuba City Regional Medical Center, Ak-Chin Indian Community, Gila River Indian Community, and the Knowledge River Program at the University of Arizona SIRLS.

Jeanette mentioned a number of lessons learned, including choosing the right organization to work with and that multiple outreach approaches should be used concurrently. Doing things right doesn't necessarily guarantee success. Success depends on identifying and working with a key local champion. Turnover is a big issue, because someone may leave after development of a relationship. Also, keep in mind that tribes may be hesitant to say "No." Low tech approaches can be as effective as high tech approaches, and fellow exhibitors are great contacts. AHSL has successfully worked with ten tribes, out of a total of 21 in the state. They have found listservs to be an effective communication tool, and AHSL is now regularly invited to participate in various events. Future plans include staying visible and having more dialog with Arizona Health Sciences Center faculty.

Kay mentioned the Pala tribal library staff training that was sponsored by InfoPeople. She also mentioned that Jim Curtis and Jeanette Ryan were appointed to a new Steering Committee created to follow up on suggestions and recommendations proposed at the Conference on Native Health Information Services in the U.S. held in July in Albuquerque, NM.

• Other Resource Library Initiatives/Ideas

The topic of how to leverage ongoing efforts to broaden outreach was mentioned as a way to begin discussion. The issue of helping hospital librarians as they face financial pressures was also mentioned. It was noted that members of the San Diego Health Science Library Group are all under pressure and facing lots of staff turnover. It also takes a long time to fill vacant positions. Could Resource Libraries help at the system level? New staff in hospital libraries is sometimes not able to argue well in support of their libraries. The Hospital Library Section of MLA provides support for hospital librarians to do advocacy, which is important since most hospitals are looking for ways to cut costs.

Unaffiliated health professionals need help in using resources. What are academic medical center doing for outreach to these individuals in terms of CME, etc.? Telehealth and telemedicine are strategies to reach distant areas and do training in rural locations.

AZHIN, a consortium of libraries including hospital libraries, gives visibility to hospital libraries and electronic resources that are available. Arizona does not seem to have as many problems with hospital libraries closing as other places. When hospital library staffs don't include librarians, it's harder to work with and train them. Electronic access to materials can be used as a hook to catch the attention of administrators. There is a need to keep up with non-librarian staff members and make sure they stay up-to-date. There seems to be little need for document delivery in Arizona, since few interlibrary loans are requested. Perhaps health professionals are not seeking the best articles, but rather use articles that are freely available electronically. Nobody wants to wait to get articles anymore.

There was agreement that the proposal writing assistance component of the new RML contract was a good idea, and may be helpful to hospital librarians wishing to apply for funding. One

suggestion was to implement a circuit-rider librarian to help with proposal writing, and perhaps also with administering grants or funding awards.

• Funding – Alan Carr – see powerpoint

Alan highlighted the new e-submission process for NIH grants, which will be fully implemented by October 2007. Heidi mentioned that in addition to NN/LM and NLM funding programs, NN/LM PSR generally has unexpended funds at the end of each contract year, which could be applied towards outreach projects.

Nevada Go Local Project Launched

In September, 2006, Nevada became the 18th MedlinePlus Go Local site with the debut of NevadaHealthNet.org, providing residents of the Silver State with a reliable, fast and user-friendly internet database to locate health information, as well as health services, providers, and other resources in their communities. There are about 2200 listings included in Nevada HealthNet, and the project team will continue to accept suggestions for additions or other changes to the database. Suggestions may be made with an online form available through the "Contact Us" link. Nevada joins Arizona as the second state in the NN/LM Pacific Southwest Region to successfully launch a Go Local site.

Nevada HealthNet is a statewide project jointly developed by Savitt Medical Library at the University of Nevada School of Medicine in Reno; the Lied Library at the University of Nevada Las Vegas; and the Health Science Library at West Charleston Library, part of the Las Vegas-Clark County Library District. Congratulations to the project team: Carole Keith, project director and reviewer for Northern Nevada; Florence Jakus, coordinator and reviewer for Southern Nevada; and Jim Curtis, Savitt Medical Library Director. Student helpers at the Savitt Medical Library also contributed to the project. Funding for the project was obtained through the NN/LM Pacific Southwest Region. The project team has promoted MedlinePlus and Nevada HealthNet throughout the state, to groups such as the Nevada Library Medical Group and at annual meetings of the Nevada Library Association.

As is the case with many of the other Go Local sites, Nevada HealthNet may be searched directly or by a health topic search using MedlinePlus. To search the site directly, simply visit NevadaHealthNet.org, and then select from the map or choose a county or city from the lists provided, to see all health programs and services in a particular area. To see a directory of health programs and services related to a specific disease or condition, start with MedlinePlus and do a health topic search. On the right side of the health topic page, look for the Go Local search box. Use the map or the drop-down menu to find and select Nevada. Then choose a city or county or search by zip code to see a listing of health services and resources for the condition.

For our next five-year contract, NN/LM PSR has allocated funding to establish Go Local services in California, Hawaii and the Pacific Basin. For California applicants, priority will be given to proposals that target California's most populous counties; these include Los Angeles, Orange, San Diego, San Bernardino, Riverside, Santa Clara, Alameda, Sacramento, Contra Costa, and Fresno counties. Prospective applicants are encouraged to review the Participation Guidelines and to contact Associate Director, Heidi Sandstrom.
