## STROKE REHABILITATION IN AREA V AND OTHER AREAS

An important event of last week was the graduation of the first three Stroke Rehablitation Liaison trainees of the AREA V program—Carol Fisher, RN of St. Joseph Hospital, Burbank, Dorothy Gale, RN, of Presbyterian Intercommunity Hospital, Whittier and Joan Mitchell, RN of San Gabriel Community Hospital. These nurses have now returned to their respective institutions to begin development, with the help of their colleagues, of stroke rehabilitation programs which, in each case, with the betailored to the particular needs of their hospital and its community.

As a finale to their training, the nurses spent most of May 27 in a debriefing session with AREA V staff members. Dr. Robert H. Pudenz, Chairman of AREA V Stroke Committee, Mrs. Kay D. Fuller, Mr. Leon C. Hauck and John S. Lloyd, Ph.D. were given the personal reactions of the trainees to the educational experience in which they had participated, along with suggestions of what could be added to advance their knowledge and understanding of stroke care, and their comments on reporting for evaluation purposes. The experiences of these nurses and their hostals in implementing stroke rehabilitation programs will be carefully documented for study and evaluation.

Dr. Pudenz expressed satisfaction with the promising start of the AREA V program and outlined plans to keep in close touch with the three "pioneers" and their intitutions.

Reporting on the Area IV RMP Stroke Conference, held May 24, Dr. Pudenz commented that it was an interesting opportunity to hear of activities in stroke rehabilitation:

"The principal speaker was Clark H. Millikan, MD, who is a member of the National Advisory Council to RMP. He cited an important achievement of RMP the development of a matrix for comprehensive health care programs which, in his opinion, will

continue with or without RMP. The National Advisory Council is looking for comprehensive attacks on the total problem—not on just various facets—of stroke rehability—tion.

"There are 47 currently funded stroke programs in three general categories in RMP. Thirty of these programs are "demonstration of care" types and of the remainder, the largest number is concerned with education. A large program on the investigation and listing of national facilities for stroke care has been undertaken by the American Neurological Association and funded by RMP.

"Some of the stroke rehab activities going forward in Area IV (UCLA) include: The 2-year old program at Daniel Freeman Hospital, which has a long-range plan for development of a rehabilitation center. All patients undergoing stroke rehabilitation are placed in one ward, with the use of a day room on the same floor. A multidisciplinary stroke committee in Santa Barbara told of their service primarily as a resource center and a communications forum. The training of a nurse-coadinator for the entire community is being considered. The Stroke Committee for San Fernando Valley was described as focusing on education. They have developed a "traveling medicine show" for use at breakfast or luncheon meetings at various institutions. A stroke workshop for paramedical personnel is to be conducted on June 5. An interesting idea from the San Luis Obispo area was the development of a "dizzy clinic" which, it is hoped, will discover patients with transient ischemic attacks. They have also started a supply center for such items as wheelchairs, braces and other items for loan or rent to stroke victims.

"The Stroke Committee in Area II (Davis) are conducting a stroke registry, funded at about a 50% level which, it is hoped, will lead to dialogue among interested physicians, and will assist in the diagnosis and treatment of stroke patients.

"Fifteen of the twenty-five hospitals in Area VIII (Orange County) have sent stroke teams for their training program, however, only four of the hospitals have developed programs. The breakdown was said to occur when the patient leaves the hospital and they are exploring the possibility of having acute hospitals conduct training programs for personnel of neighboring ECF's. Other attainments of Area VIII were described as the aphasia program, involving Cal State at Fullerton and the Easter Seal facility, which has trained three students in its first year, with II students registered for next year; a home training course in neuroradiology; a course for training dentists in treatment of stroke patients."

## STAFF ACTIVITIES

GLADYS ANCRUM, DrPH and DOROTHY
E. ANDERSON, MPH were delegates at
the recent American Nurses Association
Conference in Miami. Over 7600 nurses
attended from US--143 from California.

Delegates considered a resolution on "Society in Crisis"; approved remedial programs to prepare minority group students for entrance into schools of nursing, scholarships, and financial aid; asked for aggressive action to secure national health insurance through restructuring of our present health system, and for redefinition of federal priorities; reaffirmed their belief in quality health care for all.

The "Be Involved" Nurse Award of \$2000 was won by Audra Pambrun, a Blackfoot Indian, for her 20 years' active participation in raising the level of social and health services on her reservation in Browning, Montana. Half of the award money is to go toward the building of a health center which Miss Pambrun has started on her reservation.

ROBERT H. PUDENZ, MD, was elected Vice President of the Society of Neuro-logical Surgeons at their mid-April meeting in Boston.

Juniata College, Huntington, Pennsylvania has conferred upon GEORGE C. GRIFFITH, M.D., the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws.

#### AREA ADVISORY GROUP

members, at the regular meeting on May 12, endorsed the AREA V continuation application for the third year of the 1968-71 grant funds and heard reports on:

- The First Annual Conference on the Physician and the Hospital Medica. Staff Leadership: Fact or Fiction, reported by Henry B. Dunlap.
- The 2nd Allied Health Conference of RMP, reported by Miss Dorothy E. Anderson, MPH
- The Conference of RMP Coordinators of Airlie House, reported by William A. Markey.

A special meeting was called for May 19 to consider priorities for a group of nine studies which have been proposed as projects that might be undertaken with unused funds, if approval is forthcoming from CCRMP and DRMP. Highest ratings went to a Free Clinic Liaison Program, the San Fernando Valley Health Consortium, a Demonstration of Integrated Health Care for Senior Citizens, Summer Experience for Allied Health Students and a Respiratory Training Institute.

RMP's future is being discussed this week at hearings before the House Commerce Committee's Subcommittee on Health. AMA is expected to side with opponents of the Administration's Bill which favors combining RMP and Comprehensive Health Planning Services.

"California Regional Medical Programs— Past, Present and Future" has been suggested as a theme for a meeting tenta tively scheduled for the fall of 1970, for the staff from the various Areas, plus selected volunteer members, particu larly those involved in Advisory Groups.

A retreat-type conference, lasting 1½ days, is favored, and several locations are being investigated. An Ad Hoc Conference Committee, composed of Dr. Donald W. Petit (Chairman), Dr. Donald Brayton, Dr. Robert C. Combs, Mrs. Jeanne D. LeBrun, Miss Elma Plappert and Charles White, Ph.D. has been appointed by Paul D. Ward, Executive Director, CCRMP.

#### LIBRARY SERVICES

Librarians and health professionals from Arcadia, Baldwin Park, Covina, Duarte, El Monte, Glendora, La Puente, West Covina and Monrovia gathered May 13 to discuss the development of Health Science Libraries and the needs of their communities. A liaison committee, composed of Norvelle A. Harris, M.D., William D. Kaplan, Ph.D. and Marilyn Zajicek, RN, was designated to represent the East San Gabriel Valley area. This is the fourth meeting held by John Connor, Chairman of AREA V Library Services Committee and John S.
