CONFERENCE REPORT

Lee D. Cady, Jr., M.D., Chairman of AREA V COMMITTEE ON SYSTEMS AND COMPUTERS, attended the "Symposium on Health" sponsored by the Operations Research Society of America (known as ORSA) held May 14-16 at the campus of the National Bureau of Standards in Gaithersburg, Maryland. He reports:

"The audience was composed primarily of OR\$A members, of which 200 are members of its Health Applications Section—only a few representatives of RMP were present. John R. Hall, who is in charge of the grants program in Health Services Research and Development in the HSMA of HEW, was prominent in the organizing committee of this conference.

"The meeting was presented in five half-day sessions, to give ORSA's response to two reports--The Commission on Health Manpower and The Commission on Health Facilities. Each session began with a presentation concerning problems in medical care by a Chairman of one of the Commission's Committees, followed by a speaker representing the viewpoint of specialists in operations research. The Commission Reports recommended combining the offices of RMP and Comprehensive Health Planning and many of the discussants had similar thoughts while at the same time recognizing the overwhelming proportion of deaths from heart disease, cancer and stroke.

"There were additional presentations and discussions of data from ongoing projects, for example, economic models of medical care costs and benefits. I found the ideas of a number of the speakers to be new and interesting.

"The meeting was an excellent guided tour through the reports of these Commissions
