IN PURSUIT OF HEALTH CONSUMER CITIZENSHIP

The Thirty-two Southern Californians who agreed to meet had more in common than an interest in health education. Each had testified, last January, at the L. A. hadring held by the President's Committee on Health Education; all wondered why some action couldn't be taken on a more local basis.

The group, composed of representatives of public and consumer organizations, and health officials and educators, had been invited, early in 1972, to tell the President's Committee what education they thought would best help every American to achieve and maintain a reasonable level of health. Special interest was indicated in programs involved in specific action; in habit or attitude changing; support for community action; education which leads people to know when to consult their physician, especially at the early stages of serious disease; and community health, planning, and the development of health facilities and services.

On Nov. 28, after an opening address by Leon Miller of COMP-LA, a list of health education problems identified at the original hearing was discussed in three workshops. (A) consumer needs; (B) provider health education needs; and (C) organization/administration/funding needs. There was visible reluctance to leave unexplored the many possibilities for action that were presented, and a committee was formed to consider whether a formal organization should be created, and what its goals and activities might be. Named for this task are: Al Torribio (Assoc. Coordinator, Area IV RMP) who has been asked to act as Chairman; Rev. Emmett Sarracino (Administrator of the American Indian Free Clinic); Dr. Jack Torney, (Chairman, Health Sciences Dept., Cal State College, Long Beach); Peter Cortese, (Project Coordinator for SEARCH) and Vera Saucedo, consumer representative from East Los Angeles.

Conveners of the Nov. 28 meeting were <u>Dr. Petit</u> of AREA V, Dr. Edward B. Johns, Professor of Health Education, UCLA, Joy G. Cauffman, PhD, member of the President's Committee, and Vera Saucedo.

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The Chinese Community Free Clinic, Inc. which began operating as a dental clinic in November, will be open every other Sunday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. The tiest Clinic session treated 16 children, most of whom were provided transportation. Dental services for the underserved members of the L.A. Chinese community are the Clinic's first undertaking, with comprehensive medical services as the ultimate anal. The Clinic seeks to alleviate some of the major health problems caused by the influx of more than twenty thousand Chinese immigrants into the Los Angales area. It has received seed money from AREA V, as well as staff support from Gail M. White. The Clinic, located at 3000 Ramona Road in Alhambra, is coordinated by Wai Chaw Leon, pastor of the Seventh-Day Adventist Chinese Church.

The California Regional Kidney Disease Program invites the participation of individuals, organizations, community groups or institutions in submitting proposals that might improve the status of health for kidney diseased patients in California. The ECF Education Project Steering Committee

reports that enrollment in the "Team Approach to Patient Management" courses shows a marked increase in registration of nursing home administrators and corresponding decline in the registration of nursing directors. To date, 9 sessions have been conducted with 299 administrators as opposed to 123 nursing directors attending. Since the course is designed for both the administrator and director of nursing emphasizing development of complementary management tools unique to the nursing home environment, administrators who have taken the course are being urged to send their nursing directors to one of the upcoming sessions. The name charge is intended to identify more accurately the territory included in the scope of the project, which is administered by the Center for Urban and Regional Studies, Claremont Graduate School.

Some AREA V people have been participating in a number of sessions called "Hospital Community Relations—a Discovery in Styles" coordinated by Joint Health Venture, and taking place on Thursday afternoons from Oct. 12 to Dec. 7. Reverend Emmett Sarracino, Administrator of the American Indian Free Clinic, is a member of the panel for "The Role of the Hospital in the Community"; Liston A. Witherill, (former Chairman, Area V Advisory Council,) is invited to participate in "Planning for Hospitals"; Michael Wood (President of the Southern California Council of Free Clinics) is on the program for "Styles in Volunteerism"; and the Minority Refention Program (funded through AREA V, operated by the East L. A. Health Task Force) is listed as one of the field trips in "Styles in Manpower Development."

The National Urban Health Conference is now rescheduled for May 13-16, 1973, in Chicago reports Teresita Moreno of AREA V staff, who happens to be a member of both state and national planning committees on urban health. Some of the issues to be on the agenda are urban methodology, review and comment role, and revenue sharing. Dr. Harold Margulies, Director of RMPS, has described the forth-coming conference as an educational experience for Regional Medical Programs, not for consumers, and has specified that while recommendations may influence future policy, the conference will not formulate policy.

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
