The NIS was established to provide an on-going, consistent data set for analyzing vaccination levels among young children in the US and disseminating this information to interested public health partners.

The National Immunization Program works throughout the 50 states, the

District of Columbia, and the U.S. territories and commonwealths to maintain and enhance early childhood vaccination coverage levels. To monitor vaccination coverage for all recommended vaccines for children 19 through 35 months of age, the National Immunization survey (NIS) is being conducted in 78 areas, consisting of the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and 27 metropolitan areas. Beginning with the second quarter of 1994 the NIS data collection effort will conduct independent quarterly surveys in each of the 78 IAP areas. This will make it possible to combine four consecutive quarters of survey data with a degree of precision sufficient for analytic purposes to provide annualized estimates of the coverage rates for the five antigens (DTP, Polio, MMR, Hib, and Hep B) within each of the 78 IAP areas recommended in 1994. The survey has been flexible to allow monitoring of newly recommended vaccines.

Others, such as reference books and textbooks, can cost as much as \$525.00¹, while other titles may be purchased for \$21.00. With respect to journals, annual subscriptions range from \$125.00 to \$1,817.00, with \$500.00 being the average. The full project report is available in PDF format for printing.

What Are Health Outcomes? Why Are They Important?

In this time of scarce resources, it has become increasingly necessary to justify the impact of any health care intervention. Clinical findings alone, while important, are often an insufficient measure of an intervention's impact. The study of health outcomes looks beyond the physiological measures of success to examine the effects of the health care process on patients and populations.

Health outcomes research seeks to understand the effects of health care practices and interventions. Researchers in this field use various measures of outcomes in hopes of using their findings to develop better ways to monitor and improve the quality of care. Some examples of measures of outcomes include:

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




NIH to Develop Network for Quantifying Patient-Reported Outcomes

As part of the NIH Roadmap for Medical Research, the National Institutes of Health (NIH), part of the Department of Health and Human Services, provided approximately \$6 million in fiscal year 2004 to fund six primary research sites and a statistical coordinating center for a Patient-Reported Outcomes Measurement Information System (PROMIS) network. This trans-NIH initiative, managed by the National Institute of Arthritis and Musculoskeletal and Skin Diseases (NIAMS), aims to develop ways to measure patient-reported symptoms such as pain and fatigue and aspects of health-related quality of life across a wide variety of chronic diseases and conditions.

"There is a pressing need to better quantify clinically important symptoms and outcomes that are now difficult to measure," says NIH Director Elias A. Zerhouni, M.D. "Our clinical research communities would benefit greatly from efficient, consistent, well-validated approaches to measuring these and other subjective outcomes."

Alaska Federal Health Care Access Network

The AFHCAN project will attempt to bring better health care to Alaskans in rural areas, using telemedicine technologies. The 248 sites mobilized by AFHCAN to participate in the Alaska telemedicine project will include military installations, Alaska Native health facilities, regional hospitals, small village clinics, and state of Alaska public health nursing stations. AFHCAN designed a standard telehealth platform of which nearly 300 have been deployed in Alaska. AFHCAN also developed a robust enterprise-wide software solution that is hosted on 42 connected servers throughout Alaska, built a statewide satellite-based IP network reaching to nearly 200 sites, and developed support and training services to implement and sustain telehealth at the AFHCAN sites.

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


