From Kansas City International Airport: Take Interstate 29 South to Highway 169 South. Continue on Highway 169 South across the Broadway Bridge over the Missouri River (Hwy 169 becomes Broadway, do not turn right). Follow Broadway 18 blocks to Pershing and turn left to the hotel.

From South: Take Interstate 35 North and exit on Broadway and turn right. Go 12 blocks to Pershing Road and turn right. Proceed three blocks and the hotel will be on the right just past Main Street.

Henrietta H. Fore was nominated by President George W. Bush in May 2007, and confirmed by the U.S. Senate in November 2007 as the new Administrator of the U.S. Agency for International Development. In this capacity, she is concurrently designated by Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice as the Director of U.S. Foreign Assistance. As the first female Administrator of USAID, she is responsible for managing U.S. foreign assistance, including support to countries recovering from disaster, trying to escape poverty, and engaging in democratic reforms. She oversees a staff of approximately 8,000 people, of whom more than 75 percent are working overseas in USAID field offices.



Immediately prior to her confirmation as USAID Administrator, Ms.

Fore served as Under Secretary of State for Management, a position she held beginning in August 2005. Prior to this appointment, Ms. Fore served as the 37th Director of the United States Mint in the Department of Treasury between August 2001 - August 2005. She had also been a Presidential appointee at the U.S. Agency for International Development from 1989 -1993, first as Assistant Administrator for Private Enterprise in the U.S. Agency for International Development and then as Assistant Administrator for Asia.

In addition to her foreign policy experience in government service, Ms. Fore has held leadership positions in numerous international non-profit organizations. She was a Trustee and Executive Committee Member at the Center of Strategic and International Studies. She also served as Chair of the Audit Committee and Member of the Executive Committee of the Aspen Institute Board of Trustees. In addition, she served as a Trustee or Director of the Asia Society, The Asia Foundation, The Institute of the Americas, and the United States Committee of the Pacific Economic Cooperation Council.

As Director of the United States Mint, Ms. Fore managed the world's largest manufacturer of coins, medals, and coin products. The United States Mint produced 13 billion coins in 2004 for







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the nation's trade as well as gold, silver and platinum bullion coins, commemorative coins, and medals for investors and collectors.

Earlier in her career, Ms. Fore was a successful business woman running her own company and serving on the boards of public corporations. She was Chair and President of Stockton Wire Products, a manufacturer and distributor of steel products, cement additives and wire building materials for the U.S. and European construction industry. She served on the Corporate Boards of the Dexter Corporation and HSB Group Inc., both listed on the New York Stock Exchange.

Ms. Fore has a Bachelor of Arts degree in History from Wellesley College and a Master of Science degree in Public Administration from the University of Northern Colorado. She received the 2004 Alumnae Award from the University of Northern Colorado and the 2006 Alumnae Award from the Baldwin School. She has also studied International Politics at Oxford University and studied at Stanford University Graduate School of Business.

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
Michel Gabaudan

Prior to his appointment as international president of World Vision in 1996, Dr. Hirsch served as chief operating officer, vice president for development and vice president for relief operations. He joined World Vision in 1976 as manager of computer operations.

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

Mr. Packnett holds an Agricultural Economics degree from Alcorn State University in Lorman, Mississippi.

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
John Reinhart

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Mara Russell

Manager of Title II Institutional Capacity Building Land O'Lakes

As the Land O'Lakes Food Aid Program Manager, Ms. Russell provides training and technical assistance on food aid and food security, coordinates the development of food aid programs, and advises on food aid programmatic and policy issues.

Ms. Russell's work in the field of international food aid and food security began at CARE twenty years ago, where she provided support to CARE's global food aid programs. After the first Gulf War, Ms. Russell assisted CARE/WFP emergency food aid operations in northern Iraq, and then in southern Somalia. From 1992-93, she helped coordinate food distributions and relief supply monitoring for CARE's program in Russia and the former Soviet Union. Later, she lived in Scotland for several years where she worked for a local authority and various charitable organizations.

From 2000-04, Ms. Russell coordinated Food Aid Management (FAM). FAM was a 16-member consortium of Title II Cooperating Sponsors funded by the USAID Office of Food for Peace. It facilitated the development of food aid and food security standards, provided the opportunity for technical specialists from a wide range of organizations to collaborate on the development of technical tools, methods, and best practices via working groups, and workshops. FAM also supported information sharing through its Food Security Resources Center (FSRC) with over 8,000 references, including those developed by member organizations, and its website that not only posted many of these documents and the FSRC database, but linked to other important websites and online resource centers. While with FAM, Ms. Russell assisted with the development of the Food for Peace Strategy for 2006-2010.

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Edward Schafer

Secretary of Agriculture U.S. Department of Agriculture

Ed Schafer was sworn in as the 29th Secretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) on January 28, 2008.

Secretary Schafer brings a record as an innovative two-term governor of North Dakota to USDA, along with extensive private sector experience as both an entrepreneur and a business executive.

Schafer served as North Dakota's governor from 1992 to 2000 and made diversifying and expanding North Dakota's economy, reducing the cost of government and advancing agriculture his top priorities in office.

He worked to normalize trading relations with China and develop that nation as an export market for North Dakota farm products. He also led efforts to upgrade

North Dakota's communications infrastructure and make high-speed voice and data networks available to farmers, ranchers and rural businesses.

To expand the state's job base, he encouraged the growth of value-added agricultural industries such as pasta and corn sweetener manufacturing.

As Governor, Schafer managed a state workforce of 12,000 people, oversaw a budget of \$4.6 billion, and led the state's response to emergencies such as the severe floods that hit the Grand Forks area in 1997.

As chair of the Western Governors Association, Schafer led regional efforts to demonstrate how technology could improve the efficiency and lower the cost of delivering government services such as health benefits and food stamps. He also worked to make telemedicine more available and affordable in rural areas.

Schafer was elected chair of the Republican Governors Association in 2000 and that same year he cofounded and co-chaired the Governors Biotechnology Partnership to increase public understanding and support for the benefits of agricultural biotechnology.

He has had a lifelong interest in conservation and helped arrange the U.S. Forest Service's May 2007 purchase of the 5,200 acre Elkhorn ranch in North Dakota. The site was where Theodore Roosevelt had his home and operated a cattle ranch in the 1880s. It is near the preserved town of Medora-the state's leading tourist attraction.

Born and raised in Bismarck, North Dakota, Schafer graduated from the University of North Dakota in 1969 with a bachelor's degree in Business Administration and earned an MBA from the University of Denver in 1970.









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Secretary Schafer's grandfather immigrated to North Dakota from Denmark and homesteaded land in Hettinger County that he turned into a wheat and livestock farm. Schafer spent summers there while growing up. He helped his uncles with chores, tinkered with engines and learned firsthand about agriculture.

Before entering public life, Schafer was an executive with the Gold Seal Company in Bismarck, a successful marketer of nationally-known consumer products such as "Mr. Bubble" bubble bath, "Glass Wax" glass cleaner and "Snowy Bleach." The company had been founded by his father, Harold Schafer.

Secretary Schafer joined Gold Seal after he earned his MBA and held a series of management positions with the company before becoming president in 1978. Under his leadership, Gold Seal's sales climbed to \$50 million through acquisitions and new product introductions, and its net worth tripled. It was sold in 1986. Schafer then went on to launch several new businesses, including a commercial real estate development company, a fish farm and a classic car dealership.

After leaving office in 2000, he co-founded Extend America, a venture capital-backed company, to provide wireless voice and high-speed data services to commercial and residential customers in five rural Midwestern states.

He also served as a director of the Theodore Roosevelt Medora Foundation that oversees the historic town's operations and became active in leading several other nonprofit and citizens advocacy groups in North Dakota.

Secretary Schafer enjoys the outdoors and his hobbies include bicycling, hiking, scuba diving and restoring classic automobiles. He and his wife, Nancy, have four children; Tom Schafer, Ellie Schafer and Eric Jones and Kari Hammer; and eight grandchildren.

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Philip Shapiro

President and CEO
Liberty Maritime Corporation

As the President and Chief Executive Officer of Liberty Maritime Corporation, a New York based ship management company, Mr. Shapiro oversees the management and operation of eight vessels aggregating more than 400,000 deadweight tons, seven of which fly the US flag. The company currently operates one of the largest privately held US flag dry bulk fleets.

The Liberty fleet includes the three newest and most modern US flag dry bulk vessels participating in the US Food Aid programs. Over the last twenty years, Liberty's ships have successfully transported over 28 million tons of US origin food aid on over 500 voyages to more than 40 countries worldwide and other cargoes for various US government agencies including the Departments of Agriculture, State, and Defense as well as the United Nations World Food Programme and various private voluntary organizations (PVOs).



The company also operates a 2005 built 6100 unit pure car truck carrier roll on/roll off vessel in the US government's Maritime Security Program. This vessel is one of the newest state of the art commercial Ro/Ro vessels in the US flag fleet and the MSP. Liberty has contracted for additional PCTC sistership vessels, which will be delivered over the next two years.

Prior to founding Liberty Maritime Corporation in 1988, Mr. Shapiro served as Vice President and General Counsel of Apex Marine Corporation. During his eight years in that position, he developed his understanding of the intricacies of ship management, fleet operations, vessel financing and governmental regulation of US flag shipping. Before joining Apex Marine in 1980, he practiced corporate and real estate law with a law firm in New York City.

Mr. Shapiro graduated from Columbia University in 1974 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science and in 1978 received a Juris Doctor degree from Hofstra University Law School. He was then admitted to practice law by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court of the State of New York as well as by the United States District Court for the Southern and Eastern Districts of New York.







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Currently, Mr. Shapiro serves as a Director on a number of private and public corporate and charitable boards, including the National Maritime Historical Society, the United Seamen's Service, and the American Maritime Congress. He is an elected member of the American Bureau of Shipping and serves on its North American Committee as well as its ABS Council. He is also an Associate Trustee of the North Shore - Long Island Jewish Health System, the largest health care provider on Long Island, New York, and is a member of its Executive Associate Trustee Committee.

During his 28 years in the maritime business, Mr. Shapiro has appeared before numerous Congressional committees and administrative agencies as a spokesman for the US flag shipping industry. Most notably, he was the dry bulk shipping sector's representative to President Reagan's Commission on the Merchant Marine and National Defense and was one of four industry executives selected to serve on President Clinton's Maritime Policy Working Group in1994, headed by then Secretary of Transportation Federico Pena, which helped to develop the Maritime Security Program that was subsequently enacted into law by the Congress in 1996.

In 1998, Mr. Shapiro was named Management Man of the Year by the Maritime Port Council of Greater New York and Vicinity. He also received the Admiral of the Ocean Sea award in 2001 from the United Seamen's Service for his service and contribution to the American shipping industry. In 2002, he was presented with the prestigious Ellis Island Medal of Honor for his leadership and achievements in the international shipping community. Most recently, he was the recipient of Hofstra University's Distinguished Service Award in December 2007.

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Josette Sheeran

Executive Director World Food Programme

Josette Sheeran became the eleventh Executive Director of the United Nations World Food Programme in April 2007. As the leader of WFP, Ms. Sheeran oversees the world's largest humanitarian agency, which each year gives food to an average of 90 million people in at least 80 of the world's poorest countries. WFP reaches out to hungry people who cannot help themselves, with a special emphasis on women and girls who suffer disproportionately from hunger and malnutrition. WFP aid recipients include victims of war and natural disasters, orphans and families affected by HIV/AIDS, and school children in poor communities.



Ms. Sheeran was appointed to the post at the end of 2006 by former UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan and FAO Director-General Jacques Diouf and her appointment was unanimously approved by the WFP Executive Board. She comes to the post after serving as Under Secretary for Economic, Energy and Agricultural Affairs at the United States Department of State. There she was responsible for economic issues including development, trade, agriculture, finance, energy, telecommunications and transportation, with much of her focus on economic diplomacy to help developing nations advance towards economic self-sufficiency and prosperity.

Believing that effective policies to address global issues such as hunger and poverty must focus on long-term solutions in addition to urgent responses, Ms. Sheeran has developed several important U.S. initiatives and aided development of critical multilateral projects to aid reconstruction in Afghanistan, in Pakistan after the 2005 earthquake, and in Lebanon after the 2006 war.

In 2006, she was appointed by Secretary-General Annan to the High-level UN Panel on System-wide Coherence in the areas of development, humanitarian assistance and the environment. As part of the UN Panel, Ambassador Sheeran has conducted hundreds of interviews with development and humanitarian experts, NGOs and national leaders throughout the world, and found WFP to be a gem in the UN system.







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Ms. Sheeran has also served as Deputy U.S. Trade Representative in the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR). There she advanced the African Growth and Opportunity Act, which helps African countries develop trade capacity so they can successfully compete in international markets. She was responsible for trade negotiations in Asia and Africa, and was instrumental in launching the first USTR trade capacity building department.

Ms. Sheeran has a 20-year proven track record as a management leader, including overseeing the U.S. Department of State's economic diplomatic corps of 2,000 people. Before joining USTR, she was Managing Director of Starpoint Solutions, a leading Wall Street technology firm that works with Fortune 500 clients. She also served as President and CEO of Empower America, a Washington D.C. think tank, where she advanced the agenda of economic empowerment for inner cities and developing nations.

Ms. Sheeran has a distinguished background in media. During her tenure as managing editor of a U.S. major newspaper, she was a regular commentator on television news programs and twice served as a Pulitzer Prize juror, including for foreign reporting.

She has been a member of the Council on Foreign Relations for more than a decade and has served on its Washington advisory board. She has served on a number of other boards, including the Washington boards of the Urban League and the United Negro College Fund.

Ms. Sheeran has received numerous awards, including the Press Award for Journalistic Achievement by the National Order of Women Legislators and a national award for developing and promoting African-American journalists. She earned her Bachelor of Arts Degree from the University of Colorado in 1976.

United States Representative to the United Nations Organizations in Rome

Ambassador Gaddi H. Vasquez is the 8th United States Representative to the United Nations Organizations in Rome. He was nominated by President George W. Bush and unanimously confirmed by the United States Senate on June 29, 2006. Mr. Vasquez was sworn into office on September 7, 2006 by Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice.

Ambassador Vasquez is actively engaged in raising international awareness of the urgency of addressing world hunger. Since the beginning of his tenure as Ambassador, he has traveled to Egypt, Mali, Zambia, Malawi, Guatemala, Honduras, Mozambique, and Bangladesh to view how U.S. resources provided to the UN for the benefit of the poor and malnourished are reaching those with the greatest need. He has been accompanied by foreign journalists who have reported on the humanitarian aid being




provided by the United States to countries throughout the world. Ambassador Vasquez has been an active proponent of UN reform by leading efforts to generate greater accountability and transparency in the management and performance of UN agencies in Rome.

Ambassador Vasquez most recently served as the Director of the United States Peace Corps and became the third-longest serving Director in the Peace Corps' 47 year history. Under his leadership, the Peace Corps realized a 30-year high of Volunteers in the field, significantly enhanced the safety and security systems world wide, and oversaw the largest congressional appropriation in the Peace Corps' history for three consecutive years. During his tenure, the Peace Corps also worked with six countries to participate in the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief, opened the first Peace Corps program in Mexico, and directed the entry or re-entry into 21 Peace Corps countries.

Ambassador Vasquez's public career includes service at the city, county, state, and Federal levels of government. He began his 27-year career in public service as a police officer in Orange, California. He served as an appointee of three former California Governors and was appointed by former President George H.W. Bush to federal commissions.

Ambassador Vasquez is an active public servant and has received numerous awards for leadership and community service, including the Outstanding Alumni Award by the American Association of Community Colleges, the Coro Foundation Crystal Eagle Award, and the Marine Corps Scholarship Fund Globe and Anchor Award. He is the recipient of the Jewish National Fund Tree of Life Award and the Salvation Army's William H. Booth Award for Service.









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Mary Wilson

Mine Action Spokesperson Humpty Dumpty Institute

It was a vision of musical stardom as a Detroit teenager that inspired Mary Wilson to co-found one of the most successful female singing groups in recording history – The Supremes. She has more than forty albums to her credit and numerous awards and honors. Ms. Wilson began a solo career in the 1970's and has performed for royalty and heads of state around the world, including at the White House. In addition to continuing her solo singing career, Ms. Wilson has written a best-selling autobiography, performed in theater and on screen, and lectured and toured around the world. Her humanitarian causes include being a Cultural Ambassador for the U.S. State Department and traveling to Africa to speak with children about the dangers of HIV/AIDS. Most recently, she has become a Mine Action Spokesperson for the Humpty Dumpty Institute.



In 2007, Ms. Wilson traveled to Sri Lanka and Laos to visit HDI's mine action programs and to raise awareness of the continued scourge of landmines and unexploded ordnances around the world. In 2006, the Humpty Dumpty Institute received a \$2.93 million Food for Education grant from the USDA to improve basic education and address Laotian unexploded ordnance (UXO) as a barrier to school attendance. This is the first USDA Food for Education grant in Laos, and it is also the first initiative in Laos to explicitly link UXO clearance with increased school attendance through school feeding.

The Humpty Dumpty Institute is among the nation's premier frontline organizations in the battle against the international landmine epidemic. HDI establishes unique and innovative partnerships to fund landmine clearance projects around the globe. In 2004, HDI pioneered a new model for funding mine action by monetizing surplus U.S. food commodities and applying the proceeds toward the mutually reinforcing goals of de-mining and agricultural development. Through these partnerships, HDI has directly contributed nearly \$10 million for landmine clearance programs in Angola, Armenia, Laos, Lebanon, Mozambique, Sri Lanka, and Vietnam. In addition, HDI's founders created the Adopt-A-Minefield Program in 1998, which has raised an additional \$20 million over the past decade.

Land O'Lakes

Land O'Lakes International's presentation will illustrate how its food aid activities have supported market-driven agribusiness systems to generate economic growth, improve health and nutrition, and alleviate poverty. Land O'Lakes will highlight its USDA food aid activities, particularly School Nutrition and Dairy Development programs. These programs are based on value chain models that build local capacity and attract private sector and government investments, resulting in local ownership and long-term sustainability.

Chapin Living Waters

Drip Irrigation for Third World Kitchen Gardens

This presentation traces drip irrigation from its beginnings, to its use in huge commercial fields with a savings in the costs of water, fertilizer, and labor, and the development of gravity-fed systems for small kitchen gardens.

In 1974, Chapin introduced gravity fed drip systems in Senegal in response to a request from Catholic Relief to irrigate vegetables during the dry season. Initially, a barrel was mounted above the soil and drip lines were connected. This worked very well, but the system was far too expensive for the lady with little or no income.

Subsequently, Chapin developed smaller Bucket Kit systems, which have been used by more than 2,000 organizations in over 150 countries. If a lady can get 10 gallons of water daily, she can grow enough vegetables for a small family.
