



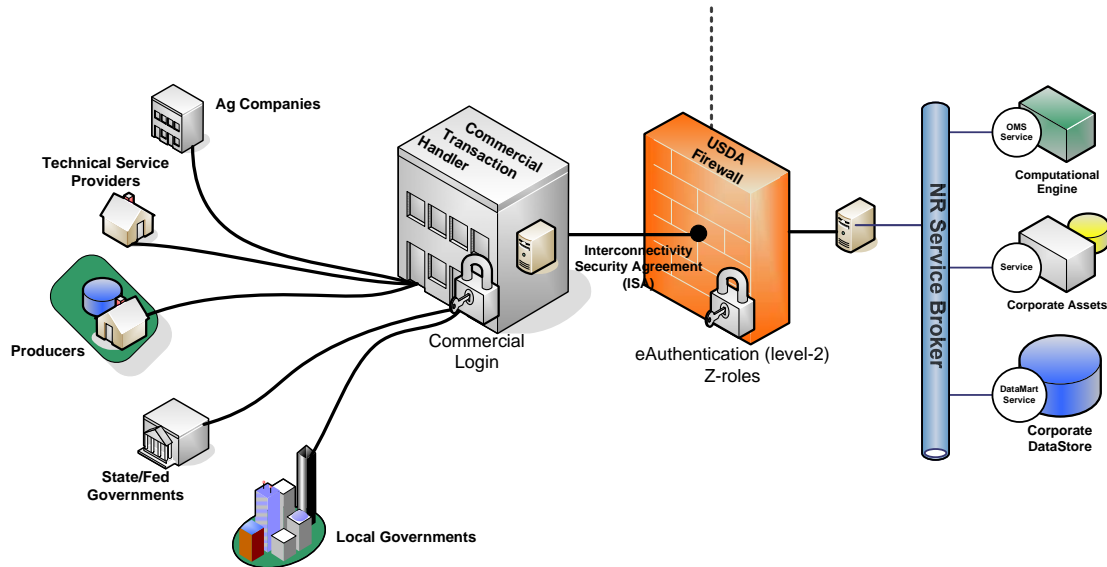
Located along the right side of the home page, the new 'I Want To' navigation block provides quick links to the main and most frequently accessed areas of the site. Some of these links connect to new sections that provide detailed guidance to TSPs through step-by-step guides, as well as links to additional information and resources. These new Web pages include comprehensive and up-to-date information on becoming a TSP, receiving TSP training, completing a TSP renewal, updating the TSP profile, and registering a business. Within these sections, additional supporting information and links also have been incorporated into the site. Topics include obtaining and maintaining a USDA e-Authentication Level 2 account and training with AgLearn. In addition, drop-down menus that link to state-specific TSP information and resources have been added to the site in multiple locations. Finally, existing pages such as the TSP Profile and the Registry search have been updated.

## **USDA-NRCS Conservation Transaction Plugin**

The Conservation Transaction Plugin (CTP) project is being developed by NRCS in concert with partner commercial companies. The concept of the CTP is to have a transactional Software Development Kit incorporated into commercial partner software products. Technical Service Providers (TSPs) or producers can buy this commercial software containing the Plug-In, and through a subscription service and a USDA e-Authentication account, obtain access to authorized folders and records in NRCS/USDA National Conservation Planning (NCP) databases to view and update as necessary.

We currently have three commercial partners who have the necessary Interconnectivity Security Agreements and the server/support infrastructure necessary to provide this access. NRCS has been working with two of these partners recently in a national pilot test of this infrastructure to verify completeness and operation readiness.



We have engaged commercial partners in this effort to increase efficiencies and better serve existing and future TSPs. Service to producers will be greatly enhanced by a more effective infrastructure. The agency will, in the near future, rely on commercial providers to handle the TSP support (essentially all the support outside the USDA firewall). Commercial providers will charge a subscription fee to help offset the costs of handling this support.

A TSP will have the same access to conservation planning information as the District Conservationist who uses the NRCS Customer Service Toolkit software. The TSP can check out a customer folder from the NCP and have it locked. TSPs will be able to make conservation practice changes, and in some cases, changes to the planning area, and then check the folder back in. There will be limitations to this activity since some planning units may be tied to a contract and those areas can only be modified by the District Conservationist.

A primary impetus for the plugin has been the projected increase in the development of comprehensive nutrient management plans, resulting from an anticipated Environmental Protection Agency regulation dealing with animal feeding operations and concentrated animal feeding operations.

State TSP coordinators have been briefed on the plugin project and the pilot effort. The pilot effort is expected to be completed this

summer. After the pilot evaluation and revision period, this infrastructure will be available for TSP use nationwide. We continue to explore technologies that will provide TSP access to the wealth of resource data available to agency personnel. Look for more to come.

## **TSP Payment Rate Developments**

The TSP Payment Rates available on the TechReg website have been updated to reflect 2008 prices. The address for the site is <http://techreg.sc.egov.usda.gov/NTE/TSPNTE2>. The 2008 TSP Payment Rates are 3.5% higher than the 2007 TSP Payment Rates, mirroring the general 3.5% federal employees pay increase.

The new website and updated NRCS TSP Handbook changed payment terminology from “Not-to Exceed Rates” to “TSP Payment Rates.” The term “Payment Rates” is now implemented for all payments made by NRCS to farmers. Clients are responsible for the cost difference between NRCS reimbursement and the actual TSP charge. NRCS has no role in the client’s contract with the TSP.

The updated NRCS TSP Handbook also allows State Supplemental Rates (STSPPR) to be developed by states based on the following criteria:

- (1) local conditions result in workload time estimates that are 10 percent more or less than indicated by National program rates to plan, design, install, and checkout a conservation practice;
- (2) a State conservation practice does not exist in the National TSP payment rates; and
- (3) a TSP payment rate is needed for a system of conservation practices.

When developing a single STSPPR for a system of conservation practices, justification, and documentation will follow the same process used in the TSP Payment Rate Exceptions Procedure for a single conservation practice. The STSPPR can be found on the national TechReg website in the National TSP Payment Rates

database. States can then use the STSPPR in the same manner as they use the regular National Rates. See Chapters 610.42 and 610.43 in the updated TSP Handbook.

### TSP Educational Event Held

Seventy Technical Service Providers (TSPs) and agricultural professionals attended a recent TSP college educational event in Omaha, Nebraska on March 11-13, 2008. The Heartland Regional Water Animal Manure Management Team, a Midwestern regional group focusing on promoting regional dialog about water quality issues, hosted the event. The workshop provided training on topics related to comprehensive nutrient management planning, nutrient management planning, and manure management planning. Subject matter such as alternative manure treatment systems, feed management, and development of comprehensive nutrient management plans were discussed. Hands-on experience with software tools such as RUSLE2 and the Purdue Planner were also provided to participants.

The instructors were Dr. Robert Burns of Iowa State University; Joe Lally, Iowa Technical Service Provider; and Mike Sexton, Iowa Technical Service Provider. Judy Martinson, Iowa NRCS TSP Coordinator, opened the event by providing participants with updates on the TSP Initiative, registration, certification, and verification process.



The Heartland Regional Water Animal Manure Management Team hopes to host the TSP college workshop annually, as an important addition to its other TSP and agriculture related educational offerings.
