Environmental and Resource Economics - This program develops and transfers knowledge with innovative approaches to today's complex resource allocation and agro-environmental issues. The program goal is to help farmers, ranchers, households, communities, and policy-makers understand trade-offs in their decision making and to help them make more economically and environmentally sustainable choices. Priority areas include developing recreation/tourism for health and economic well-being; evaluating land use/landscape changes and agro-ecosystem multi-functionality; quantifying intangible goods and services; and assessing conservation program effectiveness.
