







Clean hands are all about good health for students, teachers, administrators and the entire school community! But until now, the idea of teaching about clean hands meant finding room for yet another topic within an already busy day.

It's all about incorporating hand hygiene into your existing curriculum . . . and it's a snap with SNAP - the School Network for Absenteeism Prevention!

What is the SNAP Initiative?

SNAP is a grassroots, education-based effort to improve health by making handwashing an integral part of the school day. It's capped off by a National Recognition Program that your students can enter for exciting awards!



- How the SNAP Campaign can supplement the school curriculum, address education standards, and excite staff and students about the health benefits of clean hands.








