Northeast Region at Boston Explores Lincoln's Legacy of Freedom

Among the records of U.S. District Court of Massachusetts is this small scrap. This Bill of Lading from 1826 details by name and age the specifics of cargo being transported from Baltimore to New Orleans. The cargo (slaves), after slaying the master and mate of the vessel *Decatur*, took control of the vessel. It was subsequently taken over by another vessel, which brought the slaves and the *Decatur* into the port of Boston. At that point, acting on behalf of the owner of the cargo, a representative petitioned USDC for custody of the cargo, that it might be returned to its owner in Baltimore.

The issue of slavery was one our government began to confront in its earliest days. Jefferson would excise the passage about slavery from the Declaration of Independence; the Framers would touch upon it in the Constitution; and Federal legislation in 1794 and 1808 would limit our involvement in the Trade. Although slavery would officially end early in the New England states, and Abolitionism would grow in New England, the lucrative illegal slave trade actually continued up to the Civil War, and the evidence of the New England slave trade is right here at the NARA Northeast Region–Boston.

The illegal trade in human cargo is documented in various records within the Region's holdings. Some of these records are directly associated with the legal challenges to slavery, the illegal importation or international trading of slaves, and records of those who sought to assist the freedom seekers. In the U.S. District and Circuit Court records, one finds slave trade cases from 1796 to 1864. Here also is the first part of the *Amistad* case heard in U.S. Circuit Court in 1839 in which the defendants stated that "they are not now and never were slaves." In the case *U.S. v. Lewis Hayden*, 1851, Lewis Hayden was charged under the Fugitive Slave Law of 1850 for assisting freedom seeker Frederick (Shadrack) Minkins. Recently one of the Primarily Teaching summer institute participants found fugitive slaves in plain sight within the 1850 census. There are also additional fugitive slave cases and customs records documenting human cargo and contemporary sentiment.

A research priority for the Northeast Region–Boston is to document slavery and the resistance to enslavement. As partners in the

National Park Service Network to Freedom, the Region has enlisted several volunteers to inspect the U.S. District Court records for the New England states, and they have turned up numerous cases in all four coastal states. The Region is putting some of its volunteer resources in this area during FY 2009 and hopes to publish a monograph documenting these important records. All of these records offer a deeper understanding of our history.

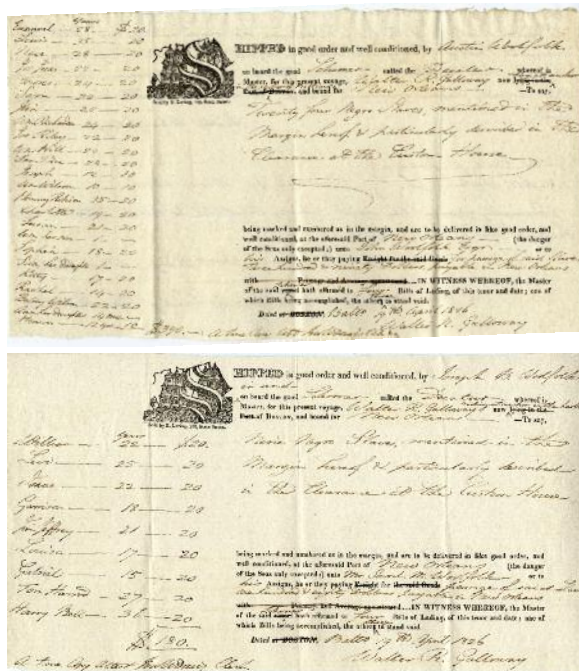
As part of its commitment to studying slavery and the struggles for freedom, NARA Northeast–Boston has several ongoing programs in observance of the Lincoln Bicentennial, Martin Luther King, Jr., birthday, and Black History Month. One of the education programs for grades 5–8 explores the microfilm records of the 54th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry (Colored). Recently, the Region presented a program for a class from the Fenn School in Concord, MA. Working in groups with the compiled service records of the notable members of the 54th, the students identified the stories that these records tell for each individual. The students also had an opportunity to speak with staff historian Joe Keefe, who led a tour of the Archives and discussed Civil War records.

The Northeast Region–Boston hosted a teacher workshop on document-based questions (DBQs) that focused on the individual documents and accompanying text of the exhibit. Their input will assist in identifying activities for the educational component of the online exhibit.

The Lincoln Bicentennial has been a focus of the Region. Education specialist Annie Davis recently gave a presentation on our Lincoln-related holdings to the Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission of Massachusetts in the Governor's office. The Region is collaborating with the Civil War Roundtable of

Boston for a lecture program in April. The Region will also host an open house, tours of the Archives on the hour, a broadcast of the Lincoln Teach-in from Archives I, and a public lecture on Lincoln and the Civil War all on February 12th.

We at Northeast Region–Boston hope it truly is a year that represents a new birth of freedom!
