1970s

VEL R. PHILLIPS

becomes the first woman and the first African American elected to statewide constitutional office as Wisconsin's Secretary of State.

1990s

MICHAEL R. WHITE

begins his tenure as the longest-serving mayor in the history of Cleveland.

SISTER CORA MARIE BILLINGS, RSM

is recognized as the first African-American nun to lead a Roman Catholic parish.

REAR ADMIRAL MICHELLE J. HOWARD

becomes the first African-American woman to command a U.S. Navy ship, the USS Rushmore.

EDDIE N. MOORE, JR.

assumes the presidency of Virginia State University.

2000s

MATTHEW GUIDRY, PH.D.

retires as deputy director of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion.

LELAND D. MELVIN

blasts off on a 13-day, 5.3 million-mile journey on the space shuttle Atlantis.

DIANNE REYNOLDS-CANE, M.D.

is appointed the first African-American woman president of the Virginia Board of Medicine.

FREDERICK R. NANCE

is named regional managing partner in the global law firm, Squire, Sanders & Dempsey.
