Vickie Nadolski was appointed Director of the National Weather Service Western Region in January 1999. She oversees the management and operation of twenty-four Weather Forecast Offices, three River Forecast Centers, and four Aviation Center Weather Support Units, which provide weather, water, and climate forecasts and warnings for eight states, adjacent waters, and ocean areas for the protection of life and property and the enhancement of the national economy. In November 2006, Ms. Nadolski was named NOAA Regional Collaboration team lead for NOAA's Western region. She is responsible for directing NOAA's regionalization along four priority areas in the Western U.S.: Integrated Ecosystem Assessment, Integrated Water Resources, Hazard Resilient Coastal Communities, and Outreach and Communications. She began her NWS career as a staff meteorologist in 1976 in Cleveland, Ohio, where she issued public, aviation, and marine weather forecasts and warnings for 32 counties in Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Lake Erie.

Ms. Nadolski holds a Bachelor of Science in Mathematics from the University of Georgia with a Bachelor of Science equivalent in Meteorology from Pennsylvania State University. She received the honorable Fellow status with the American Meteorological Society in January, 2006. Her numerous awards include the Department of Commerce Silver Medal and several awards from local, state, and national organizations for her work on automating surface observations. She became OAR's first Communications Director in April 2006 after building a communications office for NOAA's National Weather Service's (NWS). Her goal then, as now, is to find innovative ways to tell the NOAA story to a variety of audiences and gain support for the agency and its mission. Among her accomplishments as the NWS Communications Director, from 2000 – 2006, was implementing an internal communications program driven by qualitative research. Ms. Exler also set a new standard for NOAA exhibiting by pulling together all NOAA Line Offices into one exhibit at the 2003 American Meteorology Society Meeting. These standards are now procedures for NOAA's exhibit program.

Her first NOAA assignment was in 1994 as the NWS Public Affairs Director. In 1998, she served on the leadership team that conducted a White House climate conference for broadcast meteorologists. OAR is not the first research organization where Ms. Exler has led communications activities. At NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center (GSFC) from 1985-1994, she honed her skills first as a Public Affairs Officer and later as both the GSFC News Chief and head of the Public Information Unit. In these roles, she managed a team that developed national media campaigns, ran an employee communication program, and interacted with the public and special interest groups. She gained crisis communication skills while working at NASA's Kennedy Space Center following the Space Shuttle Challenger disaster. Known for her creative solutions, when NASA discovered that the Hubble Space Telescope had a lens problem and was "near sighted" Ms. Exler convened a daily telephone conference call so media across the country could collectively interact with NASA scientists and engineers.

Before joining NASA, Ms. Exler began her federal career in 1980 at the U.S. Department of State where she served as the Public Affair Officer for Mid-Atlantic Public Programs in 1984. She was member of the advance team for Secretary George Schultz for several trips she organized a World Affairs Conference in Pittsburgh, Pa. A native of Baltimore, Md., Ms. Exler resides in Silver Spring, Md. with her husband Sandy Kramer and daughter Molly.
