<i>much, a lot of</i>	<p>"Much" and "a lot of" are used to indicate quantity. Both terms mean "a great amount or quantity." "Much" is an indefinite pronoun and is always singular. When it is used as a subject or as an adjective modifying a subject, it requires a singular verb. "A lot of" can be singular or plural.</p> <p>"Much" and "a lot of" are also called "quantifiers." Quantifiers are words that precede and modify nouns. They tell us how many or how much. Selecting the correct quantifier depends on whether the word is a count noun or a noncount noun. The main difference between count nouns and non-count nouns is whether you can count the things they refer to.</p> <p>Count nouns refer to things that exist as separate and distinct individual units. They usually refer to what can be perceived by the senses. You can make most count nouns plural by adding "s" to the end. Volunteer is a count noun.</p> <p>Noncount nouns refer to things that can't be counted because they are thought of as wholes that can't be cut into parts. They often refer to abstractions and occasionally have a collective meaning (for example, furniture). Noncount nouns don't pluralize. Time is a noncount noun.</p> <p>"Much" is used to quantify a noncountable or singular object, as in "I don't have much time."</p> <p>"A lot of" works with both count and noncount nouns, as in "I don't have a lot of time" and "There are a lot of</p>

<p><i>Where should I</i></p>	<p>“Should” is a modal verb. Modal verbs are used to express ideas such as possibility, intention, obligation and necessity. Other modal verbs are can, could, may, might, must, ought to, will and would.</p> <p>When a question begins with the adverb “where,” it signals that the speaker wants or needs information. This is called an “interrogative.”</p> <p>Shannon asks, “Where should I go for the training?” She wants to know the location at which she will receive training for volunteering at the animal shelter. She is told that she needs to go to her local animal shelter for the training.</p>

<p>Federal Volunteer Programs</p>	<p>Federal volunteer programs are programs that offer people a chance to help others locally, nationally, and internationally. Three federal programs that rely on the work of volunteers are AmeriCorps, the Peace Corps, and Citizen Corps.</p> <p>Volunteers in AmeriCorps help nonprofit organizations in the US with the work that they do to help others. Trained AmeriCorps members tutor and mentor youth, build homes, clean and maintain parks and waterways, teach computer skills, assist with disaster response, and run after school programs. You must be at least 17 years old to be a member of AmeriCorps and be a U.S. citizen, national or lawful permanent resident.</p> <p>To be a member of the Peace Corps you must be at least 18 years old and be willing to commit to a little more than 2 years of service. Since the 1960's, the Peace Corp has been sending trained volunteers to help meet the needs of people in countries all over the world. In an effort to promote peace and friendship, volunteers have served as teachers and mentors, helped farmers plant and grow crops, and new mothers care for their babies. Peace Corp volunteers have worked in over 130 different countries since it began.</p> <p>Citizen Corps is a volunteer program that is committed to the safety and security of individuals, families, and communities throughout the United States. Citizen Corps volunteer activities are coordinated to serve in response to terrorism, crime or any type of disaster within a neighborhood or community. Emergency medical teams, law enforcement agencies, non profits, neighborhood organizations are just a few of the services that play a role in carrying out the work of Citizen Corps. There is also an emphasis to train and prepare all citizens and to provide them with the necessary equipment and information to handle emergencies in their homes and communities when they arise.</p>
<p>Non-profit organizations in the United States.</p>	<p>Nonprofit organizations are companies that do civic, educational, charitable and religious work. They are called nonprofit because their goal is focused more on the purpose or service around which they were created than on making money for that service or purpose.</p> <p>Habitat for Humanity is a nonprofit organization that has become an international organization. This nonprofit builds or rehabilitates safe affordable homes in an effort to eliminate poverty and homelessness throughout the world. Through local affiliates the organization forms a partnership with a homeowner in need. The labor is volunteered and the materials and money needed for construction are donated. The houses are not given away. Mortgages are paid and the homeowner contributes many hours in the construction of their Habitat home and that of others.</p> <p>Another nonprofit organization is the American Civil Liberties Union, or as it is commonly called the ACLU. The mission of this organization is to defend and preserve the rights and liberties given to all in the United States by the Constitution and the Bill of Rights. Much of the work of the ACLU is done in the courts, in local governing bodies, and communities. Freedom of speech and the press, rights to privacy, due process, and equal protection under the law are some of the individual liberties the ACLU works to preserve.</p>
