  - Applicant must own the property before April 30, 2009;
  - Applicant cannot be a potentially responsible party;
  - Applicant must have an ASTM E1527-05 Site Assessment completed at time of application; and
  - Project must have high likelihood of completion within 24 months

Program Title: Clean Water State Revolving Loan Fund

Short Description: Loan (grant) funds for municipalities' wastewater/clean water projects

Status: Application to EPA will be submitted in March. DES must finalize an Intended Use Plan and hold a public hearing before EPA will make grant award. Most likely grant will be provided in April, 2009.

Award Criteria: DES is developing a priority system to evaluate pre-applications submitted on February 27 for award to municipalities.

<u>Time Line for use</u>: From DES to municipalities: 3 or 4 months (maximum). Municipalities will have a maximum of 12 months to have contracts signed with contractors and work underway.

<u>Time Line for use</u>: Preference to activities that can be started and completed expeditiously, including a goal of using at least 50 percent of the funds for activities that can be initiated not later than 120 days after the date of the enactment of this Act. Recipients shall also use grant funds in a manner that maximizes job creation and economic benefit. ARRA, Sec 1602

Program Title: Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grants

<u>Short Description</u>: Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grants will go directly to larger cities and to counties; the State will receive funds under this program to sub-grant funds for energy efficiency and conservation projects to other municipalities

ARRA Appropriation nationwide:\$784,000,000Estimated New Hampshire Funds:\$10,000,000Granting Agency:U.S. Department of EnergyManaging Agency:Office of Energy and Planning ("OEP")Status:Awaiting grant guidance from U.S. Department of Energy.

<u>Award Criteria</u>: Projects shall be for energy efficiency, renewable energy and carbon reduction; program design and process now being developed by OEP. New Hampshire must make certain energy related assurances to qualify for these funds.

<u>Time Line for use</u>: OEP must modify state energy plan to include revised goals on energy efficiency no later than 120 days after enactment – approximately June 12, 2009. Secretary of DOE has up to 120 days to approve; grants then provided to states; states then have 180 days to distribute to municipalities.

The Office of Energy and Planning manages the State Energy Program (SEP). Under the ARRA, they believe that this program will receive approximately \$28.7 million in funding. Presently, OEP has some discretion on how SEP funds are distributed; however, the guidance from the Department of Energy for these additional funds has not yet been released. The guidance should be available in the next few weeks. New guidelines are likely to be similar to the mandatory requirements in the 2008 guidance. They are as follows:

- Establish mandatory lighting and efficiency standards for public buildings;
- Promote carpools, vanpools, and public transportation;
- Incorporate energy efficiency criteria into procurement procedures;
- Implement mandatory thermal efficiency standards for new and renovated buildings;
- Permit right turns at red lights and left turns from one-way street onto a one-way street at a red light after stopping; and
- Ensure effective coordination among various local, State, and Federal energy efficiency, renewable energy and alternative transportation fuel programs within the state.
- These are the only mandatory activities, with additional tasks left up to the discretion of the State Energy Office. The Department of Energy suggests different programs for inclusion into the State Plans.

Once the grant guidance has been issued from the Department of Energy, OEP will have a clearer understanding of the range of discretionary activities allowed with SEP stimulus funds.
