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










Fifth Annual Genealogy Fair

WHAT: The National Archives will host its fifth annual Genealogy Fair. The fair showcases Federal records located at the National Archives and professional genealogy organizations' resources for doing research on family history; and will provide information and guidance for beginners, as well as experienced genealogy professionals. The winners of the National Archives Awards for Excellence in Genealogy will be announced during the fair. This event is free and open to the public in partnership with the Foundation for the National Archives and Ancestry.com.




Archival Research Catalog (ARC)

9/11 Commission Textual Records

On January 14, 2009, more than 150 cubic feet of textual records created by the 9/11 Commission were opened to public research. The records, which were accessioned by the National Archives following the Commission's closure in August 2004, comprise about 35 percent of the complete collection. The collection includes those documents that best reflect the scope and purpose of the independent, bipartisan Commission's investigations. Though materials created by the legislative branch are not subject to the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), the Commission stressed its desire to make the records as publicly available as possible by January 2009. Users can view the August 20, 2004, letter to then-Archivist of the United States John Carlin, in which the issue of accessibility is discussed, at www.archives.gov/legislative/research/9-11/letter-tocarlin.pdf.

Among the released records are interviews, office files, and background information on "the terrorists, past terrorist events, al Qaeda in general....[and] emergency responses to the attacks in New York City and Washington, DC." Due to the sensitive nature of the material, extensive screening has been undertaken to protect personal privacy and national security interests.

Further records will become available as they are processed by National Archives staff. So far, approximately 4,350 file units and 1,250 digitized items from the collection have been described in the online Archival Research Catalog (ARC).

Access to Archival Databases AAD

Defense Casualty Analysis System and Combat Air Activities Files

The National Archives' Access to Archival Databases (AAD) resource now includes two extract files from the series **Defense Casualty Analysis System (DCAS) Files** consisting of electronic casualty records of U.S. military personnel who died, were missing in action, or were prisoners of war in either the Korean War or Vietnam War

as of April 29, 2008. The two files are the

Korean War Extract Data File and the Vietnam Conflict Extract Data File.

The DCAS Korean War Extract Data File is the successor to the series Records of Military Personnel Who Died as a Result of Hostilities During the Korean War (also known as the Korean Conflict Casualty File) and represents the first update the National Archives has received

for those records since transferred to us in 1980. New fields of information in the Korean War Extract Data File include religion, military occupation, and unit. The file also contains corrected or revised records and the addition of several

thousand casualty records. This includes records for military personnel who died as a result of non-hostile circumstances.

The DCAS Vietnam Conflict Extract Data **File** is the successor to the Combat Area Casualties Current File (CACCF) as of 1998. The Vietnam Conflict Extract Data File includes new fields such as unit, home of record county, and Vietnam Wall row and panel indicator. The file also contains corrected or revised records, along with a few additional records.

We have also added the Combat Air Activities Files (CACTA) to AAD. These records contain data about air combat missions flown during the Vietnam War from October 1965 to December 1970.

Both DCAS extract files, series of Korean War and Vietnam War casualty records, and the CACTA files are available online for searching and viewing at www.archives.gov/aad. Lectures describe records of the National Archives, explain how and where to locate the records, and demonstrate how to use the records for research. Each one-hour lecture is delivered twice within the same week—on Tuesdays at the National Archives Building at 700 Pennsylvania Avenue, NW, Washington, DC; and on Thursdays at the National Archives (Archives II), located at 8601 Adelphi Road, College Park, MD. Most of these sessions are videotaped and made available for interlibrary loan through NARA libraries and our regional facilities throughout the United States.

Genealogy programs include monthly workshops and lectures from our staff archivists with extensive experience in genealogy. We provide lectures on basic genealogical research and techniques and one-on-one assistance. Programs take place each month on the first Wednesday

and select Saturdays at the National Archives Building.

Symposiums are one to two full-day programs on specific genealogy research topics. Past topics have included Hispanic and African American genealogy information and guidance for seasoned professionals and novices alike.




