Columbia River Flood of 1948

There was exceptionally heavy winter snowfall in the upper Columbia River Basin during the winter of 1947–48. Warm temperatures and heavy rains in May 1948 caused snowmelt to occur very quickly. The river's waters rose rapidly, tributaries overflowed their banks, and the biggest flood since 1894 filled the Columbia to overflowing. The flood of 1948 was basinwide, affecting communities as far upriver as British Columbia. At Vancouver, Washington, the Columbia crested on June 13–14 at 31 feet above sea level.

The worst-hit community was Vanport, Oregon. Vanport was the creation of Henry Kaiser who, by 1942, operated three very large shipyards in the Vancouver/Portland area. He purchased 650 acres of lowlands along the Columbia River near the shipyards to provide housing for his workers. While he provided an entire community with a variety of services, the homes and apartments were built quickly on wooden foundations. At its peak Vanport was home to 40,000 people and was the second largest city in Oregon. In 1948 the population was down to 18,000.

By the 25th of May, Vanport was 15 feet below the water level in the river and the dikes surrounding the city were being monitored around the clock. On the morning of May 30, the Housing Authority of Portland issued a statement saying the dikes were safe and there would be time for an

orderly evacuation if needed. But a little after 4 p.m. flood waters broke through a railroad dike on the west side of Vanport and within a short time inundated the community. Most of the buildings in Vanport were swept away by the force of the water flowing through the breach in the dike. Clusters of destroyed homes ended up resting against sections of the dikes surrounding the city. The pressure of water flowing from the west combined with the impact of flood debris caused breaks in dikes on the east side of Vanport at well.

Vanport was completely destroyed by the flood and was never rebuilt. The rapid influx of water resulted in almost total loss of personal possessions. Fifteen people died in Vanport, however the toll could have been much higher since many people were away from their homes on that Memorial Day weekend. Elsewhere in the Columbia Basin, the flood destroyed 5,000 homes, forced some 50,000 people to evacuate, and caused an estimated \$100 million in damage.
