Ten Tips For When You're Laid Off or Fired

Editor's note: This article originally appeared in the 12/1/99 issue of Hotline. With today's economic downturn and higher levels of unemployment, we are reprinting the article with useful tips to help you get through these tough times.

It happened one day unexpectedly. Lisa, the senior editor of a wellknown children's magazine in New York, was called into her boss's office and told that she was being laid off. The company was having financial problems and needed to cut some of the editorial positions. With only a few hours' warning, Lisa's boss asked her to clean out her office and leave. Because of the abrupt notice, the company offered her a hefty severance package. The extra money and genuine remorse that her supervisor expressed, however, didn't minimize Lisa's feelings of shock and rage.

Believe it or not, this story has a happy ending. After six months of job hunting, Lisa was offered the job of her dreams. A dolphin lover since childhood, one day Lisa received a phone call for a job interview as the editor of ... you guessed it, a "dolphin" magazine published by the Jacques Cousteau Society. In fact, Lisa was flown to Paris for her second interview to meet the late Cousteau himself. She has been employed by Dolphin Log magazine in New York for four years now. And here's the irony of the situation: Lisa was recommended for the job by none other than her former supervisor!

This is a true story about a friend.

People experience such situations everyday (no, not interviewing in Paris)—getting laid off or worse, fired-and returned Peace Corps Volunteers (RPCVs) are no exception to this rule. The stress of having to look for a job can be overwhelming. But what happens if you find a job and it doesn't work out? Concurrently, RPCVs have to deal with the additional stresses of reverse culture shock, re-entry, and job loss. But the key is to not feel sorry for yourself! Sitting at home with a pint of Ben & Jerry's ice cream and watching "Seinfeld" reruns is okay once, twice, maybe even three times, but after that it becomes counterproductive (to your mental health and waistline). So if you're suddenly out of a job, here are 10 tips to help you deal with it:

- 1. Take a deep, long breath and process what has happened to you. Get upset, grieve, feel depressed for a couple of weeks—even hide under the bed covers if that helps. Then pick yourself up, take a shower, and go out into the world.
- 2. Assess yourself. Figure out who you are, where you want to go, and how to get there. A good book for self-reflection is What Color Is Your Parachute? by Richard Nelson Bolles—the classic career-planning book which is updated annually. You may suddenly decide that you'd be happier as a lumberjack than a banker.
- 3. Create a powerful résumé and write effective cover letters. If you are

a recent RPCV, you may want to visit the RPCV Career Center in Washington, DC which offers career resources and the use of computer equipment to help you create that résumé or cover letter. If you're not anywhere near the career center at headquarters and have Internet access, another option would be to log on to the returned Peace Corps Volunteer section of the Peace Corps Web site at <www.peacecorps.gov/ rpcv>. Information is available on everything from actual Hotlines with job postings that you can download to listings of graduate school programs around the country which offer special consideration to RPCVs.

- 4. Reach out and network. Contact friends, friends of friends, relatives, colleagues, neighbors, and former employers and tell them you are looking for a job. Get the word out in as many possible ways as you can think of, such as: phone calls, bulletin boards, and e-mail messages. Take it one step further by following up on every job lead that comes your way, no matter how small a lead.
- 5. Market yourself. Getting a job means promoting yourself in the best possible light. Don't pad your résumé, because chances are you'll eventually get caught, but do emphasize your real strengths. Arrange informational interviews so you can learn about companies that interest you and also practice interview skills to better market yourself!

6. Find out if you are eligible and file for unemployment compensation. The paperwork is daunting, but you may be able to receive some monetary help for up to six months as you search for a job. You will have to prove that you are actively looking, however, to receive these unemployment checks.

7. Consider temporary jobs or freelance assignments. Lisa took on several freelance editorial projects that helped pay the bills as she looked for permanent work. Some temporary jobs turn into permanent positions, or may offer flexible hours if you need to take a long lunch break for a job interview.

8. Don't burn your bridges. It may be tempting to badmouth your ex-boss in company e-mail messages, but it's not worth it (a perfect example is Lisa whose former boss recommended her for another job). If you remain on good terms, you will have a better chance of receiving letters of recommendation from former colleagues or getting your name mentioned in job referrals.

9. Become involved with your local RPCV group so you can talk with other people who share common experiences. Other RPCVs will be able to relate to the same re-entry issues as you, especially having to look for a job. In addition, many RPCV groups organize activities that include potlucks, holiday parties, and fundraisers that are not only fun, but also help you to network and hear about possible job leads.

10. Stay busy and look on the bright side. As you look for a job, you have more flexible hours to pursue the things that interest you. Suddenly, you're not bound by the 9-to-5 daily clock and will have more time to visit friends that you haven't seen in months, whip up an elaborate meal from your country of service, plan that cross-country trip you've been waiting to take, explore a new city for possible relocation, sleep late, write a novel, begin regular workouts, or become acquainted with your local library.

And here's one extra reason for good measure: 11. Remember that you're not alone. Many people have experienced the unpleasantries of getting

laid off or fired. It can happen to anyone at anytime. So pick yourself up and move forward. Good luck!
