or thousands of returned Peace Corps Volunteers nationwide, Peace Corps Week provides the ideal opportunity to reconnect with their Peace Corps experience while serving the third goal of the Peace Corps—to promote a better understanding of other peoples on the part of Americans.

In classrooms, businesses, houses of worship, and community centers around the country, returned Volunteers bring alive the sights, sounds, and smells of far-off places. Each year, returned Volunteers and RPCV groups find creative ways to raise awareness of both the Peace Corps' annual anniversary celebration and the valuable community resource found in returned Volunteers.

In Philadelphia, New York, and Washington, D.C., Peace Corps Day 2003
held special significance for the Minority Peace Corps Association (MPCA).
The MPCA is an RPCV group affiliated with the National Peace Corps Association and dedicated to serving minority communities and promoting greater minority participation in the Peace Corps.

Philadelphia Recognizes MPCA

In celebration of the Peace Corps' 42nd anniversary last year, the MPCA achieved unprecedented recognition when Peace Corps Day was officially recognized by Philadelphia mayor John F. Street and Trenton, N.J., mayor Douglas H. Palmer. Representatives from the MPCA and the regional Peace Corps office were invited to Philadelphia City Hall for a proclamation-signing ceremony in honor of the more than 500 Philadelphians who have served in the Peace Corps. Peace Corps Day 2003 provided the perfect opportunity for city officials to publicly acknowledge both the local and international contributions of RPCVs.

MPCA members also organized Peace Corps Day presentations in Brooklyn, N.Y., at the Paul Robeson High School, where principal Ira Weston is an RPCV (Kenya, 1979–1981). In addition, MPCA chapters in Washington and Philadelphia hosted diversity dinners in honor of the agency's 42nd anniversary in conjunction with Black History Month. RPCVs, Peace Corps applicants, families, and friends came together in a relaxed atmosphere to talk

about the Peace Corps and community service.

About the MPCA

The MPCA got its start in the living room of a small New York City apartment, where RPCVs of color met informally to discuss their Peace Corps experiences. What sprang from discussions about the life-changing Peace Corps experience is now a national nonprofit organization. In August 2001, the vision of MPCA President Leslie Jean-Pierre (Guinea, 1994-1996) took formation, and the MPCA was officially founded. In the two years since, the MPCA has formed chapters in New York, Philadelphia, and Washington, D.C., and will soon have chapters in Atlanta, Chicago, and San Francisco.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Juanita Celix is an RPCV who served in Nicaragua from 1994 to 1998. She heads the Philadelphia chapter of the MPCA, which got its official start in November 2002. The chapter has been on the move since, sponsoring several diversity dinners for area RPCVs and applicants, collaborating with AmeriCorps on community service events, participating in panel discussions and campus recruitment, and hosting the first MPCA National Conference.
